

Under its provisions and with the assistance of ingenious lawyers arrest and trial are often separated by two years where prompt and swift justice should prevail. "Criminals should be made to know that when arrested they are only two weeks off from the prison, penitentiary, the rope or deportation." He also believed that with certain changes in police methods by which known criminals could be arrested for vagrancy they could be saved from execution and Montreal made one of the cleanest cities on the continent. Mr. Calder believed that all Canadian citizens feeling themselves aggrieved by the Government should have the means of hailing the official responsible into court; he would therefore favor the abolition of the Petition of Rights. 
