on Sunday as usual, and it is hoped that
the little body of worshippers who have so
faithfully battled against heavy financial
onset will by the present purchase be en-
abled to continue their organization as a re-
ligious body.

C. & E. train on Friday and was struck by

ously injured.

ESSEX.

The population of Essex county is un-
officially placed at 55,576.
It is intended to have the new water-
works system at Amherstburg in operation
by Aug. 10.

The town of Essex will celebrate July 20
as civic holiday.
The electric light works of Essex had a
successful trial trip of St. Catharines, Ont.,
on Saturday night.

A. H. Clarke, of the firm of Clarke &
Wimser, of Essex County, who has also
been practicing law in Windsor for some
months, has been appointed deputy clerk of
the peace for Essex county. The appoint-
ment also includes that of deputy crown
attorney.

located several farms in Sandwich, East,
which members of his family have occupied
for over half a century. He died in the
year of his golden jubilee in the ministry.
The estimated number of dogs in Windsor
is 1,600; but taxes have been paid on only
473.

The parishioners of Rev. Father
Villeneuve, Tecumseh, are very much

The Sarnia School Board has engaged

\$1,000.

stepped in front of the knife while it was
in motion. In an instant, before the team
could be stopped, the little fellow's foot
was hacked and lacerated in a terrible man-
ner. It was found necessary to amputate
the foot at the ankle joint.
