THE WEATHER PROPHECY.

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 9—11 p.m.—The only
pressure changes over Canada since last night
are that the high area has drawn a little to
the southward across the lake region, and the
Northwest depression is a trifle deeper
than yesterday. A few local showers have
occurred in New Brunswick, but the weather
generally has been fine and pleasant.
Minimum and maximum temperatures:
Edmonton, 42°-74°; Calgary, 46°-70°; Prince
Albert, 45°-80°; Qu'Appelle, 48°-81°; Winnipeg,
42°-80°; Toronto, 44°-83°; Montreal, 48°-83°;
Quebec, 46°-85°; Halifax, 52°-72°.
24-HOUR'S PRECIPITATIONS:
TORONTO, Sept. 9—1 a.m.—The indications
for the next 24 hours for the lower lakes region
governing the peninsula and as far east as
Belleville are: Moderate to light weather,
stationary or higher temperature.

LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—The Market lane is in a very dirty
condition and something should be done to
clean it up before Fair week.

—Meteorologists are looking their best
at present, and those wishing to enjoy a
pretty sight had better take advantage of
this opportunity before the frost destroys
the flowers.

—Edison's phonograph is being ex-
hibited in this city privately, and those
who have heard it are pleased with the re-
production of vocal and instrumental
selections from noted artists which they
have heard.

—The London Boating Club will not
close their club house until after the Fair.
A look through the club house shows every-
thing in snug condition. The reading
room is supplied with magazines, books,
piano, etc. A bowling green and lawn
tennis ground are prepared in the rear of
the building. There are about 30 boats
in the building. The club is in a good
financial condition.

—The resolution of the North Essex
Farmers' Institute has been considered at
Montreal by the traffic representatives of
the different Canadian railways. In
quantities less than five tons fruit will re-
main as at present fixed, first-class and a
half. For lots of five tons third class to
London, Hamilton, Toronto, Ottawa and
Montreal. The five-ton arrangement only
applies to the points named, but may yet be
arranged to apply to other points.

—Rev. J. C. Parthing, rector of New
St. Paul's Church, Woodstock, was married
Tuesday in St. Luke's Church, Toronto, to
Elizabeth Mary, second daughter of
J. C. Kemp, manager of the Canadian
Bank of Commerce in that city, by the
Lord Bishop of Toronto, assisted by Rev.
Dr. Langtry, Rev. Dr. Davies and Rev.
A. J. Reid. The groom is well known in
this city, and in Woodstock the nuptial
event has thrown society ladies in a flutter
of excitement.

—Frank Smith, commercial traveler, has

building.

will act as public analyst, and probably
also as professor of chemistry at the Medical
School.

settled in the same locality in Montreal,
and soon afterward were married. About
the year 1818 they moved to the vicinity
of the city and took up a farm, afterwards
removing to Detroit. She leaves 3 chil-
dren, 21 grandchildren, 41 great grand-
children and 6 great-great grandchildren.
It was no uncommon thing for her to dine
with three generations of her descendants.

WATER COMMISSIONERS.

Mains for Burwell and Pall Mall Streets
—C. P. R. Water Service Considered—
Fifty More Meters To Be
Purchased.

At Tuesday night's meeting of the Water
Commissioners, J. Kilgour, of South Lon-
don, asked for remission of water rates for
quarter ending July 31. His son and him-
self had been using the water service at his
house, but during the quarter his son's
family were absent from the city and con-
sequently the water was not used. The re-
quest was granted.

A request was heard from residents of
Chester street for a main between Hamil-
ton and Queen streets. The communica-
tion was filed.

A request was made by George Lilley for
a main on Marshall street, east of Adelaide
street. It was referred to the chairman and
inspector.

It was decided to lay a four-inch main on
Burwell street between Dundas and York.
The request for a four-inch main on Pall
Mall street, between Wellington and
Waterloo streets, was granted.

W. F. Bullen, of Queen's avenue, asked
what rate would be charged him for motor
power to force water up to a cistern in the
attic of his house. The usual meter rates
will be charged him.

Engineer Moore reported that the price
of the Herye meters was found satisfac-
tory, and it was therefore decided to have
the engineer order 50 of them from the
Ontario Meter Company.

T. Williams was heard as to the water
service at the C. P. R. after the report of
the engineer on this matter. Mr. Williams
thought that the present rate of \$500 per
year was high enough and that the rate of 10
cents per 100 cubic feet was too high. The
engineer thought the rate should be raised.
The commissioners will reconsider the
matter and notify Mr. Williams.

The agreement with the Hellmuth Laidley
College Company was satisfactorily signed
and the water service at the Exhibition
grounds was progressing favorably—so the
engineer reported.

The engineer will procure a book, and in
it will be recorded the amount of water
pumped daily, and likewise the amount of
coal consumed by the two engines. Accounts
were passed to the amount of \$1,525.

There were present: Chairman Jones,
Secretary Ellwood, Commissioner Davis,
Mayor Taylor, Inspectors Pratt and Plas-
tow, and Engineer Moore.
