THOUGH the people of the United States drink a much fess quantity of spirituous liquors than formerly, the consumption of beer seems to have enormously increased in recent years, and that, too, in the face of a prohibitory law in several States. According to the Western Brewer the sales of malt liquors in the United States for the year ended April 30, 1890, were 26,820,953 barrels, an increase of 1,722,188 barrels over the previous year, and of 18,437,233 bar-Arkansas, Maine, Mississippi, North Carolina or Vermont. In Kansas only 270 barrels are reported to have been sold, a decrease of 7,000 barrels from last year, and in Iowa 88,266, a decrease of 24,204 from last year. Even in Pennsylvania, with high license restrictions the sale increased the past year 293,271 barrels over 1889. If the liquors sold in one year were equally dis-tributed, every man, woman and child would receive more than a third of a barrel.

What does all this needless hurry imply? Long hours and overwork for men and women.

Not, let it be remembered, because the average employer believes in that sort of thing, or indeed finds it profitable, but because the great purchasing public are so inconsiderate as to leave their shopping and their reclothing till the last moment, and then take advantage of the intense spirit of competition everywhere prevalent to attain their selfish ends. Now, all this is wrong. It is especially an evil thing for people who can avoid it to shop at a late hour on Saturday night, and thus compel employes in stores in the rear future, we are told by work till the approach of midnight. Yet we have known of shoppers with this habit abnormally developed who wondered why it was that so many of the employes of stores tailed to go to church on Sunday morning.

What is needed in every large city is they are in many large cities, but a little more forethought is certainly desirable, especially on the part of the ladies, who after all are the chief culprits, as they form the overwhelming majority of the purchasing public. Let the good and symthings, the fighting of this bad habit of late shopping, that thus unduly adds to the hours of a hard-working class in the community. WHEN HE WILL PROSPER.

The Forum for May contains a refreshing article by C. Wood Davis, a farmer and writer of repute, under the title "When the farmer will be prosperous." His idea perity lies in a restoration of the balance. and referring especially to the United States he predicts that the time is near at hand when the domestic consumption will absorb nearly all his products. "Assuming" says the writer, "the popu-

lation to be now 65,000,000, with the area in cereals producing average crops, and current consumption 15 per cent. greater per capita, than in the five years ending in 1874, present supplies are in excess of population as follows: Corn for 5,000,-000 people, wheat for 14,000,000, cattle for 6,000,000, and swine for cattle 11,000,000. Should population continue to increase as heretofore, and production not increase more than seems probable. home requirement will absorb all food products before the end of the century.' FAST TIME ON THE ATLANTIC. Time was when a journey across the Atlantic Ocean was considered a momentous affair. Men and women called upon to take it bade farewell to their iriends for ever, and at the close of a tempestous pas sage by a fast clipper ship, consuming six or seven weeks in sailing from shore to shore, were apt to solemnly assert that the farewells were most appropriate, as they would never again undertake such a trip The era of steam and mechanical appliances has changed all this. In the fast steamships of to-day, people cross and recross the Atlantic in as many days as it formerly took weeks, and once they have got their sea legs on live in as great luxury as is possible at a first-class hotel. Short though the ocean passage is, however, it will yet be shorter, according to the builder of the famous racers "The City of Paris" and "The City of New York." Now the this authority, the time will probably be reduced to five days. The chief factor that may be looked to for producing increased speed is the twin-screw engine, combined with increased power obtained by further development or improvement in the system of forced draft. This means of in this matter of shopping. We are not so bad in London as they are in many large cities. but portion to the weight, which is the principa element of progress in designing to which engineers have to look. The expert now tells us that the superiority of the twinscrew for high speed ships is beyond dispute. In all respects the twin screw is superior to the single screw. Though prior to the trial of "The City of Paris" the impression in many quarters was that the speed of the twin-screw steamers would come down in heavy weather in greater proportion than that of single screws, the result attained by that vessel and by "The City of New York" proves the reverse. This is said to be owing to the fact that in the twin screws the propellers are much better imnersed than in the single screw, and 'racing" is an occurrence almost unknown in the engine-room. A corresponding advantage to travelers from this same cause is the absence of vibration and the conse quent increase of comfort. Still another advantage is the greater immunity from breaklown, as was evidenced in a marked degree lately, when "The City of New York" proke her shaft. A further increase of speed is possible, but, according to the expert whose ideas we have quoted, it would not be prudent to try and reduce the limit below five days, because it is highly questionable whether a ship constructed with hat object in view could be made a financial success. Nevertheless, in the matter of advances in ocean steamship construction, there have been greater marvels within the last few years than a change of the character indicated. It will be interesting to note the description of craft which the Dominion Government is able to obtain for the very liberal mail subsidy which Parliament has authorized it to grant. 
