TRANSGRESSORS, TREMBLE!

The Mayor of Hull Convicted of Boozing—Disqualified and Fined.

Ottawa, June 27.—This forenoon Judge Mahott delivered judgment in the charges of boozing against Mayor Aubrey of Hull, disqualifying him for seven years and sentencing him to pay a fine of \$393 and all costs of the court which alone will exceed \$5,000.

The charges against Mayor Aubrey were:

1. Having received two promissory notes of \$500 each, in settlement of a claim in favor of Jos. Bourque, contractor for the court house and jail for \$31,569 as extras on that building.

2. Having received moneys from Mr. T. Vlau, contractor for his (the mayor's) influence in having a claim on a car passed in the city council on the Gatineau bridge.

3. Receiving money from the same party for influence in having a franchise passed by the council for the Electric Railway Company, of which Mr. Vlau is a chief promoter.

Judge Mahott found Mayor Aubrey guilty on the first charge, but the evidence on the other two charges was not sufficient to convict.

The disqualification of Mayor Aubrey will necessitate a new election in Hull.

NORTH OXFORD NOMINATION.

Prohibitionists and Patrons Choose T. R. Mayberry.

Norwich, Ont., June 27.—A meeting was held here today of the prohibitionists and Patrons of Industry combined, for the purpose of bringing out a candidate for the House of Commons for the south riding of Oxford.

T. R. Mayberry, formerly reeve of West Oxford, received the unanimous vote of the meeting, and accepted the nomination.

\$750,000 FOR A TOMB.

There is not in Europe a more magnificent burial place than the Mausoleum in the park of Hamilton Palace, Scotland, where the late Duke of Hamilton has been interred. It was built about 60 years ago by the late duke's grandfather (Duke Alexander, the son-in-law of Beaufort) at a cost of \$150,000, and Italian artists and workmen were principally employed. It is a square building, surmounted by a round tower and stone cupola, with bronze gates, which are copied from those of the Baptistery at Florence. The floor of the chapel is a beautiful and costly mosaic, composed of white, yellow and black marble, jasper, and red and green porphyry. The mausoleum is about 110 feet in diameter.

enue of \$15,000, could not get a public building. The Government refused to erect a postoffice or any other public building in the city of Woodstock, the center of the great cheese industry in Ontario, because it was situated in the constituency represented by the Liberal whip. There were many other thriving large towns for which no public buildings could be provided.

There was another item of \$15,000 for a new public building at Rimouski which was justified on the ground that visitors from abroad got their first letters there. Mr. McMullen said that Rimouski got this expenditure because it was recommended by Sir Adolphe Caron. Mr. Bowers put in a claim for a public building in Digby on the same ground, as it was the resort for many American visitors. Mr. Outram told the committee he was satisfied with the fine wharf built there.

Mr. Laurier took occasion to denounce a job in the town of St. Lin, where a building was erected for the postoffice at \$300 a year which had never before been rented for more than \$35 a year. The total revenue received was only \$750 a year.

Mr. Outram was surprised at Mr. Laurier finding fault with the renting of the building, as St. Lin was the Liberal leader's birthplace.

"Yes, it is," retorted Mr. Laurier, "and for the first time in my life I am in a position of a job attached to it." The vote passed.

On a vote of \$26,000 for a juvenile reformatory at Alexandria, Mr. Outram said it would cost about \$100,000. Mr. McMullen suggested that the reformatory be utilized for a reformatory, and one-half of this \$100,000 be used to provide another residence for the Governor-General. The item was adopted.

On the vote for wharves and breakwaters in Nova Scotia, Mr. Laurier made a strong plea for some very necessary expenditures. The House adjourned at midnight.

THE FRENCH TREATY.

A return of correspondence concerning the French treaty was laid on the table of the House of Commons in council dated Aug. 4, 1891. Attention is drawn to the fact that exception had been taken to the ratification of the treaty with France on the ground that it involved the withdrawal of the French wines under the treaty would be an obligation of the Government so long as the treaty was in force. Attention is further called to the fact that the French wine-makers make it subject to termination after twelve months' notice. Commenting upon this fact, it is mentioned that the understanding has always been that where the French wine-makers make a treaty on behalf of a colony she will not hesitate to give the necessary notice to terminate it at the instance of the colony interested. It is, however, pointed out that from the time the treaty has taken place in recent years, they, the committee of the Privy Council, cannot feel assured that the practice referred to will be followed, in support of which contention it is shown that Canada consented that Great Britain should enter the Berne Copyright Convention on her behalf in 1886, expressly relying on Great Britain giving notice of withdrawal at any time she should desire her Government should desire such notice to be given. Canada had been persistent for upwards of five years in endeavoring to get the British Empire to withdraw from the Convention, but the Canadian Government had no assurances that their wishes had been acceded to. The order in council concludes with this remark: "While matters remain in this condition, your Excellency's advisers would be open to severe censure should they recommend the issue of a proclamation bringing the French treaty into force, even if it should be ratified in France."

On the 29th of September 1894, Lord Ripon, in acknowledging the receipt of a copy of the foregoing order in council, assures the Canadian Government that notice to terminate the French treaty will be given by the British Government if at any time the Government of Canada should desire it. Again, on Nov. 30, Lord Ripon cabled that assent was given to the French treaty and that the British Government would reduction of duty granted to France would be extended to nations entitled to the benefit of the most favored nation clause in Canada, and to the rest of the world, inasmuch as the treaty resulted to the satisfaction of the Dominion. The Minister ventures the hope that the prayers of this address may be soon granted, and that the Dominion may be freed from the operation of these treaties, intimating at the same time, that the policy of the Government of Canada was to concede to powers entitled to the most favored nation treatment the same privileges as will be enjoyed by France under the French treaty.

By order in council dated Jan. 23, 1895, the Minister of Trade and Commerce advised that he had received from the British Government the question of imperial legislation to remove obstacles which might exist to the power of the self-governing dependencies of the empire entering into agreements of commercial reciprocity with each other.

March 22, 1895, Lord Ripon cabled Lord Aberdeen that a colony was not a third power. In view of this interpretation the Minister of Trade and Commerce reported to the council that there was no further reason why the agreement should not be ratified by proclamation, and that the British Government was actually prepared to communicate this desire to the Secretary of State for the Colonies that the treaty might be ratified.

On April 18, the Hon. Commissioner cabled that immediate ratification of the French treaty was very important to the British Columbia wool trade. The Colonial Office advised the passage of the "most favored nation" treatment from Canada and the rest of her Majesty's dominions.

Lord Ripon, in conclusion, states that

The French Government have expressed some irritation at the delay which has occurred in the ratification of the treaty that no time will be lost in obtaining the necessary legislation.

NOTES.
It was decided today that the House would not sit on Monday—Dominion Day.

Mr. Foster stated that on Monday he will move that Wednesday shall from this out be made Government day.

Mr. MacLean will inquire of the Government on Monday whether an appointment has been made to fill the vacancy in the office of the Lieutenant-Governor of Manitoba, and, if not, how soon the Government intends filling the vacancy. Also, has any promise been made to the present incumbent that he will be reappointed, or is it intended that Hon. J. C. Patterson shall take the position, if so, when?

Mr. MacLean, of York, gives notice of an amendment to the act incorporating the International Radial Railway Company, by adding a clause that the passenger rate over this road shall not exceed 2 cents per mile.

To the committee on banking and commerce this morning the preamble of the bill incorporating the Alliance National was passed, but the different clauses are to be threshed out. This is a Montreal insurance scheme, to which there is much opposition.

The speech made on the bill amending the criminal code made considerable progress today and adopted a most important amendment taken from Mr. Edgar's bill, making it a criminal offence for an officer or contractor of a railway company to give any sum of money for election purposes in either Dominion or Provincial elections.
