New York, March 9,-Telegrams from Brazil give important details of the serious defeat of the Federal troops by the fanatical insurgents in the State of Ballia on Sunday. The news of the disaster was at first denied in entire gowns, wraps and head cover-Rio De Janeiro, and one paper was ings. The
