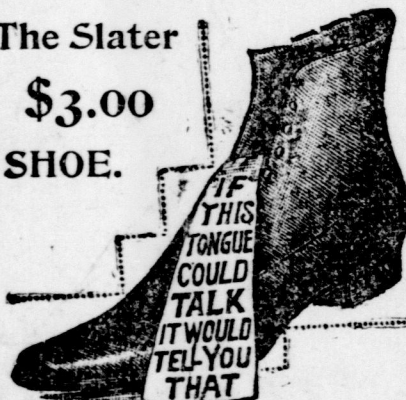

FAIR, WITH SHOWERS IN A FEW PLACES.

Toronto, Ont., June 11-11 p.m.—The pressure is now generally below normal from the lakes to the Atlantic, attended by fair weather, excepting a few showers in the Gulf district. In the Northwest there is a tendency to higher pressure. The weather has been generally fair, with a few local showers.

Sparks Committed.

For Trial on the Charge of Forgiving James McDonald's Name

For Whiskey—Another Charge Against Him—Michael Tierney Charged With Theft.

Henry Sparks was examined by Police Magistrate Parke this morning at the city justice factory. Mr. McKillop, for the crown, produced the orders by which Sparks secured two bottles of whiskey from John Garvey's store.

John Garvey, jun., swore that on Tuesday, June 9, Sparks came to the store with the order, and was given a bottle of whiskey. He said he was a porter at the Central Hotel. Mr. Garvey said he noticed that the quantity was small, but that the prisoner had said Mr. McDonald had given him the order as that was all he wanted.

He went back half an hour afterwards for another bottle, with another order, and explained that Mr. McDonald was angry with him for not bringing the bill. He asked for another bottle, and was given the second dose, with a bill for two bottles. On Wednesday, June 10, he came a third time. He got another bottle on the strength of the order, and this aroused the suspicion of young Garvey, who went into the office, and telephoned Mr. McDonald, who denied all knowledge of the orders and pronounced them forgeries.

James McDonald, proprietor of the Grand Central Hotel, was called, and swore he had given no orders to anybody.

The liquor was worth 75 cents per bottle. The magistrate looked at Sparks and asked, "Have you any questions to ask?"

Sparks—No, sir.

The P. M.—Then you are reserving your defense until further?

Sparks—Yes, sir.

Sparks is accused by Detective Thos. Nickle with the larceny of a bicycle wrench and air pump.

He elected to be tried by a jury, and was remanded until tomorrow.

The prisoner has served several terms of imprisonment. Some short time ago he did 23 months for a deception committed at Chatham.

About a month ago he was up in the Police Court charged with drunkenness. On that occasion he had fallen off a head of hay, and had a sore-looking face, which excited the sympathy of the police officials, and he was let go.

Michael Tierney was arrested on Dundas street yesterday by P. C. Highstead on a warrant issued by Mr. Hogg, a farmer, who alleges that on Feb. 29 Tierney stole \$25.00 from him.

He was remanded for a week.
