VERY FRENCH.

A murder has been the sensation of the week in Paris. It resembles the famous Gouffe case.

The victim was a man of 45 years, and a former employee in the Rue de Grenelle postoffice. His body was concealed in a trunk, and the murderer declares that death occurred several months ago. Bottles of scent were poured in the trunk to disguise the obnoxious effluvia.

The murderer was Clara Basing. Love is at the bottom of the crime. When she was traced and nearly captured, she shot her infant son and herself.

In a letter addressed to the chief of police, she asked to be buried beside the man she loved and slew.

IN THE PHILIPPINES.

General Hughes has expelled the agents Smith and Bell and Warner and Barnes from the Island of Samar for rendering aid to the insurgents in Manila by buying hemp and other produce, knowing that the same were going to the insurgents. The British consul requested General Chaffee to suspend the expulsion, but he refused to do so, and the consul is now endeavoring to personally investigate the matter.

Agulnaldo has written to Civil Governor Taft and Military Governor Chaffee, saying that he regrets, with the rest of the American nation, the great loss suffered by the people of the United States in the death of President McKinley.

STRENUOUS MEASURES FAVORED.

After forty-eight hours' discussion of the Buffalo tragedy, public opinion in England asks the question whether America will tolerate another Gouffe scandal when President McKinley's murderer is brought up for trial, says the London correspondent of the Herald.

Lynch law, as applied to this wretch, was never so nearly popular in England, all classes agreeing that short shrift is the only proper punishment.

One of his majesty's judges gives the substance of the highest legal opinion in London as to what the Buffalo courts ought to do.

IN CHINA.

Shanghai, Sept. 18.—A notable edict has been issued by the emperor dowager, ordering the institution of a general system of education by means of primary schools, common schools and colleges in every province for the enlightenment of the people.

Pekin, Sept. 18.—The evacuation of the Chinese legation and the American troops were drawn up at the inner gate; several hundred Chinese civil and military officials in brilliant costumes, diplomats, officers and ladies were massed on the piazza outside.

Prince Ching and General Chiang, the governor of Pekin, met the Japanese and American envoys and welcomed them for the protection they had afforded the palace. General Yamini and Major Robertson, the Japanese and American bands played, and the foreigners marched out through the gates they had battered in last summer. Then the Japanese soldiers, who were more numerous, distributed their forces at the various gates. The Chinese officials banquered the Japanese this evening. The American troops were present, but declined owing to the death of President McKinley.

CABLE NOTES.

"I learn upon high authority," says the Rome correspondent of the London Daily Chronicle, that Mr. Falconio will succeed Cardinal Martini as papal delegate to the United States, instead of Mr. Calabrin, as previously reported.

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MORE DISASTERS ON THE LAKES.

Terrific Sea Running—Steamer Gone Down—Two Barges Abandoned.

Houghton, Mich., Sept. 17.—Shipping disasters are following one another in rapid succession at Eagle River reef. An unknown two-stack steamer is believed to have foundered there last hands yesterday. This morning a whaleback barge was discovered resting on the reef. The life-saving crew started from the canal at 9 o'clock to the rescue. There was a terrific sea running, and up to noon it was not known whether the lifeboat had reached the stranded craft.

Owen Sound, Ont., Sept. 17.—Word comes from Tobermory this evening that the barge Jupiter and probably part of her crew have been lost on Lake Huron during Sunday's fierce gale. The crew abandoned the barge, and her captain, together with her crew and the captain's wife, reached Tobermory Monday in a small boat. The remainder of the crew took to a raft and expected to make land or be picked up by a passing vessel, but nothing has been seen of either boat or crew on the Bruce peninsula.

Southampton, Ont., Sept. 17.—The steam barge Saturn, of Kingston (Capt. Manson), and crew of ten and the cook was abandoned at 10 o'clock this morning, 40 miles northwest of here, in a sinking condition, having lost eleven feet of water in the hull. The arms of the air pump broke and in the heavy sea the water gained rapidly, in spite of the strenuous efforts of the brave captain and his equally brave crew. The vessel was not insured.

PICTURESQUE PROCEEDINGS

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ONTARIO IS A RICH MINERAL COUNTRY.

Mr. Edison Interested in the Nickel Product—New Idea for Storage Batteries.

Toronto, Sept. 18.—There seems to be no longer any doubt that Mr. Edison has solved, or is on the point of solving, the problem of securing storage batteries of a much lighter metal than the lead and zinc. It was announced that Mr. Edison was developing a process for the use of nickel for storage batteries, and following on this came a visit to Sudbury, and an investigation of Ontario's nickel resources. Today a letter was received at the provincial bureau of mines from Mr. Edison, who is back in his laboratory at Orange, N. J. He states that he has a dozen prospectors at work now around Sudbury looking for nickel veins, and when spring comes next year will put twice as many in the field. He adds that Ontario is a very rich mineral country.

THE MURDERER BEFORE THE BAR

Still Preserves Sullen Silence—Refuses to Plead—To Be Tried on Monday.

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The most notable incident of the day was the hissing of the prisoner as he was being escorted down the stairs. As a result of the urging of President Adolbert Moot, of the Erie County Bar Association, Judge Lewis, one of the attorneys assigned as counsel for the prisoner, called at the Erie county jail at 2 o'clock this afternoon to see the prisoner. Czolgosz refused to talk to Judge Lewis, and even refused to answer questions as to whether or not he wanted any counsel. Judge Lewis said that nevertheless he would appear for the prisoner upon arraignment.

When the prisoner refused to plead, the district attorney asked him if he understood what had been read, and he said "yes," and him that he had been indicted for murder in the first degree, and that he could answer "yes" or "no."

For an instance Czolgosz glanced at Mr. Penny, and it was thought that he intended to speak, but he did not. Judge Lewis then addressed the court saying that he had been unable to ascertain of any wish on the defendant's part as to the employment of counsel. His associate, Judge Titus, was in Milwaukee, but he appeared in person to enter a plea of not guilty on behalf of the defendant. He also asked permission to reserve the right to withdraw the plea and enter a special plea or interpose a demurrer. He expressed his regret that his name had been mentioned in connection with this trial, as he had a very strong repugnance to appearing, although that was a reason, which would apply to every lawyer.

Judge Lewis said that he might as well like an order of the court for aliens to examine the prisoner as the district attorney had informed him that eminent alienists had examined the prisoner on behalf of the people. This gave rise to the belief that a special plea of insanity may be entered by the counsel for the defense.

"Remove the prisoner," said Judge Emery, and Czolgosz was taken back to the jail by the underground route.

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President Roosevelt Convened the Members—Asked Them to Stay Out His Term.

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The Former Rebel Chief Has Little Liberty Despite Oath of Allegiance.

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"There has been a great change since the commission began its work a year ago. Except in a part of the islands of Mindanao and Samar, there is no guerrilla warfare or trouble of any kind. In the island of Luzon, which is much the larger of the entire group, it is entirely safe to travel anywhere without an armed escort. The number of troops on the island now is about 45,000. This is nearly 25,000 less than in the summer of 1900."
