The women and children were rescued with great difficulty, the schooner being beached at Sandy Point and the women and children being sent ashore with ropes.

EXPLANATION. The explanation is that Admiral Maigret, commander of the Mediterranean fleet, returned to Toulon at 7 o'clock yesterday evening with all his vessels, except those belonging to Admiral Caillard's division. The correspondent of the news agency referred to miscounted the vessels, owing to

the darkness. A corrected list of Admiral Caillard's ships is now published. The list cabled was that of his ordinary light division, but it appears that a special squadron was formed, composed of the battleships Gaulors and Charlemagne, the cruisers Admiral Pothuau, Chanzy and Galilee and two torpedo boat destroyers of the Halle-
