## THE MARKETS.

### LOCAL MARKET.

LONDON, Tuesday, Feb. 24.

Although the roads are in an excellent condition, and the sleighing is reported good on many of the leading thoroughfares to the city, the market held here was only an ordinary one for this day of the week. Sales were brisk, as a rule, with the exception of hay, and prices were steady to easier.

Grain—There were 25 loads of oats offered, and prices ruled mostly at 92c per cental; a few loads sold at 90c. Wheat was offered at \$1.17 per cental. A couple of loads of barley went at \$1.10 per cental.

Hay and Straw—There were about 35 loads of hay on the stand, and sales were very good for the choice hay, which sold at \$9 to \$10 per ton; the poorer quality of hay was a drug, at \$8 to \$9 per ton. Straw scarce, at prices quoted.

Butter and Eggs—There was very little offered in this line, and sales were made at prices quoted.

Only a couple of small loads of potatoes were on sale, which brought \$1.25 and \$1.30 per bag.

Apples were in good supply and sales fair, at \$1 per barrel, or 40c to 50c bag for medium quality.

Poultry—There was an exceedingly small supply offered, principally by the butchers, which sold at prices quoted.

Dressed Hogs—There were about 120 carcasses on sale, and a demand was very good, at \$7 to \$8 per 100 pounds; not many sold at the last-named figure.

### NO NEW STEEL COMPANY

Mr. Moxham Says There is Not Sufficient Ore for Two.

Montreal, Feb. 24.—B. F. Pearson, director of the Dominion Iron and Steel Company, while in the city yesterday on his way to Boston, stated that there was no foundation for the rumor that a new steel company was to be organized by Mr. A. J. Moxham at Sydney in opposition to the Dominion Iron and Steel Company. Mr. Moxham was still a director and large shareholder in the Dominion Steel Company. Besides, if there was such a company formed, there were not any more mines in the vicinity that could be secured to supply ore.

### FEARS MORE TROUBLE

Sir Robert Giffen Attacks Britain's Venezuelan Policy.

LONDON, Feb. 24.—The Times publishes a letter from Sir Robert Giffen, attacking the British Government's action regarding Venezuela, and especially the cooperation with Germany. Sir Robert says that the British Government is putting Venezuela into the hands of a commission, the security being an international arrangement more calculated to entangle European nations in South American politics and bring them into collision with the United States, could not well be devised. Venezuela, says Sir Robert, is a small country, and it is not worth the trouble of fighting for it. It will then be lawful for any power to put in execution, and the United States must either look for the Monroe doctrine nullified or intervene.

### MURDERED BY TRAMP

Beats Farmer's Wife to Death and Ransacks the House.

Elmira, N. Y., Feb. 24.—A horrible murder was committed at Trowbridge, a small town, 12 miles from here, yesterday morning. Mrs. Rachael Payne, wife of George Payne, farmer, was murdered by a tramp farm hand, named Edward Mason, who dragged her into the barn and killed her with a manure fork, pounding her so hard that he broke the handle of the instrument. He then ransacked the house and stole the money. He made good his escape and the woman was found in a dying condition at 4:30 o'clock this afternoon. Officers from four counties are on the murderer's trail.

### THE REFERENDUM FRAUDS

Evidence at Toronto Investigation of Illegal Tactics.

Toronto, Feb. 24.—At the close of the referendum investigation yesterday, Judge McCremon was not concluded hearing the case against Thomas Cowan, deputy returning officer, at whose booth three priests were personated. Cowan took the stand and swore that the scrutineers agreed to let the alleged Cassidy vote, and he could not recollect the cases of Mahoney and McCarthy. He admitted that he had been in the employ of the license holders up to the day of the vote as a canvasser, and that he had obtained his appointment as a deputy returning officer two days before the vote. He also admitted that he had not filled out the returns in the proper way, had not kept count of the ballots, but said he did not know there were 183 ballots in the box, although 173 were cast. The judge will examine the ballots in the morning. Cowan's evidence as to the incident of personating Cassidy was corroborated by John Neil, poll clerk, and the license holders' scrutineers.

### Was Saved by Oil.

LONDON, Feb. 23.—The British steamer Monadnock (Capt. Woods, which sailed from Elgin, Feb. 17, for Boston), has put into Stornoway, Scotland, and reports having encountered terrible weather during which one of her crew was drowned and four others were disabled. In addition to these casualties three of the steamer's boats were smashed, her foremast was flooded owing to a broken scuttle and considerable damage was done about her deck. The storm was so very severe that the Monadnock was only able to wear around and return by the liberal use of oil.

## Strange Power Possessed by a Canadian Boy in South Africa

Frail Girl of Twelve.

Four Men Were Unable to Lift Her From the Ground.

Port Jervis, Feb. 24.—Friends of 12-year-old Stella Lundellus are trying to explain in vain some remarkable powers which she possesses—her peculiar subject of force and reversal of natural laws. The girl, who is a daughter of A. Lundellus, a photographer, of this place, has just returned from a visit to Dr. C. O. Sahler, director of the Sahler Sanatorium at Kingstons, where her strange case was studied with deep interest by many physicians and scientists. The girl did not go to Kingstons as a patient. Although frail, she is in good health—but of nervous temperament.

At the sanatorium little Stella exhibited in semi-public for the first time her peculiar qualities. In the presence of more than one hundred and fifty persons she showed how easy apparently it was to overcome the laws of mechanics.

A strong man, who would have no difficulty in lifting another man, tried in vain to lift this child. She had but to touch him with her hand, and he seemed to vanish at once and the 65-pound girl became as heavy as a ton to him. Removing her hand from the man, however, the child suddenly disappeared, and was readily raised from the floor.

That test was but the first of many. Two men took the child in their arms, but even their combined strength proved inadequate to the task. Then another man lent his strength, and the three were foiled as easily.

### FAST BALLOON TRIP

Two Daring Frenchmen Cover 807 Miles in 30 Hours.

Paris, Feb. 23.—Jacques Balsan, a young and rich adventurer, who once commanded a Chilean gunboat, has just made a remarkable aerial journey with Abel Corot, another Frenchman.

The two left St. Cloud Wednesday morning at 11 o'clock in the balloon St. Louis. They had plenty of food, a small bed in four pieces, a mattress and a safety stove, the invention of Balsan, which provides aeronautes with hot water. Travelling before a westerly wind they passed rapidly toward the frontier, and at nightfall were over German territory, finally coming to earth in Hungary, 55 miles southwest of Budapest, having covered 807 miles in 30 hours.

### Mr. Barr is Granted an Option on Forty Different Townships.

LONDON, Feb. 24.—The Self-help Immigration Society has assisted 234 emigrants to Canada. The premature announcement from Canada that the Canadian Government is willing to pay two pounds per head towards the passage of army reservists immigrants has caused a rush to the immigration office here. Deputy Minister Smart is trying to persuade the war office to financially assist the reservists, and is also forming a committee of notable men to deal with the question. The Countess of Aberdeen writes enthusiastically of the Canadian farmer delegates' scheme, and wants to entertain the party. The delegates' scheme is to individually visit market towns on market days. The Premier of Ontario has cabled W. T. R. Preston, Canadian Commissioner of Immigration, to the effect that 10,000 farm laborers are wanted in Ontario as soon as possible.

### HOMESICK CANADIANS.

A correspondent met this morning ten Canadians who have returned from service in the South African Constabulary, after having bought their discharge. They allege it took all their pay to buy food and rations. The life was monotonous and without incident. According to these men, all the Canadians in the constabulary long for Canada, and have no use for South Africa.

### MR. BARR'S PROJECT.

Rev. Mr. Barr has been granted an option by the Government on 40 extra townships in the Saskatchewan Valley for his homogeneous English settlement. He guarantees settlers within a year. Mr. Barr is getting a high-class of people who are not reached by the emigration department.

### STOLE THE FAIR FURS!

Valued at \$20,000—They Were Replaced by Inferior Furs.

Paris, Feb. 24.—United States Consul-General Gowdy has opened an official investigation into the charges that valuable furs belonging to the late Mrs. Charles L. Fair were changed into inferior furs for inferior articles. A box containing the furs had been received here from San Francisco, and the seals were broken today by Mr. Gowdy in the presence of all those who had part in handling the articles up to the time of their shipment to America. Edward Kelly, representing the Fair estate, and Charles Chandel and M. Grunwaldt, who appraised the original garments as being worth \$21,200, were among those present. When the box was opened a shock cloak and a muff were disclosed. Appraiser Chandel said positively that the articles were not those he had appraised. The investigation will be continued.
