Trade With Australia.

In his address to the board of trade last night, Mr. Larke cleared up some misconceptions to which recent tariff rulings in Australia have given rise in this country. It is reassuring to hear that the reports of friction between the Canadian and Australian Governments have no basis in fact, and that the commercial relations of the two countries were never more promising. The customs ruling, which has created some uneasiness among Canadian shippers, provides that in computing the tariff on Canadian goods entering Australia, the Canadian freight charges shall be added to the price of the articles at the point of production. As Mr. Larke pointed out, this is more lenient than the Canadian tariff, which requires that an article shall be valued for the purposes of duty, at the selling price in the country from which it is imported, not at any price which the exporter chooses to place upon it. So far as Ontario and Quebec are concerned, the Australian regulation is an advantage, because the bulk of the goods shipped from these provinces to Australia go through United States ports, and only the freight charges from the point of shipment to the American boundary line are added to the price. For instance, a consignment of goods from London to Sydney, via New York, would pay extra duty only on the freight rate from London to Niagara Falls, whereas a consignment from Cleveland or Chicago by the same route would pay on the cost of carriage to New York. It will be seen that this arrangement discriminates in favor of the Ontario or Quebec shipper, as against American competitors equidistant from the sea coast, but it differentiates against the Vancouver route. Mr. Larke gives to C. P. R. credit for doing its utmost to build up an export business with Australia, but says the company has come to the conclusion that goods cannot be profitably carried from Eastern Canada to the Pacific coast. Transportation is the key of the problem, and a line of steamers from Montreal in summer and Maritime Province ports in winter will be necessary to the adequate development of the trade. Canadian commodities lose their identity when shipped through United States ports, and are classified in Australia as American. Canadian exports must be carried through Canadian channels.

Mr. Larke reports that the three leaders of the Australian parties, free trade, protectionist and labor, are preferentialists, and he is confident that if negotiations are prudently conducted, a preferential arrangement will be effected between the Commonwealth and the Dominion. The majority of Canadian manufacturers are too busy at present supplying the home market to cultivate foreign business, but the time will come when they would find it convenient to have a market in Australia for their surplus products, and it would pay them in the long run to secure a footing there as soon as possible, even if they made no immediate profits. The time is propitious, as Australia is recovering from the blight of an eight-year drought and her purchasing power is expanding. Even with the return of the drought, it may be some years hence, she will become again a large importer of foodstuffs, and Canadians should be ready when the opportunity offers. Mr. Larke urged the necessity for co-operation among Canadian manufacturers in arranging shipments and marketing their goods in Australia. The Canadian Manufacturers' Association, which successfully agitated for a direct steamship service with South Africa, might find another field for its energies in the development of Australian trade. There could be no better education for Canadian industrialism, in the Australian market the products of the world's workshops meet in competition. The Canadian manufacturer will find there the highest standard of excellence, and if he will ascertain whether he can make goods as well and as cheaply as his foreign rivals, and if not, why not, the result cannot but be beneficial.

Physical Training in the Schools

Sir Frederick Borden, Minister of Militia, is communicating with the educational departments of all the provinces with a view to co-operation in a system of physical training in the schools. He has found the Governments of British Columbia and Manitoba sympathetic, and hopes for a similar response in the east. Sir Frederick has not given the public the details of his plan, but it contemplates instruction in the larger schools by militia sergeants, and in the smaller ones by the regular teachers, who shall be required to qualify themselves for the work.

Sir Frederick has come well to call it physical training instead of military training. There are many people who have conscientious objections to any course in the schools which would foster the spirit of militarism or the belligerent tendencies of boys, by accustoming them to the thought of war, and the handling of firearms. There is much to be said in favor of such exercises from a physical standpoint, and probably the same results can be obtained without emphasizing the military side. The physical development of children is neglected in the schools, and too often in the home. A few simple exercises, practiced regularly, would work wonders for growing boys and girls, and would not burden a curriculum which many think is already overgrown. The children would take pleasure in them, and would not

grudge the time spent in such a way before or after regular school hours. Sound and healthy boys and girls will make a greater country than a race of youngsters whose minds have been crammed at the expense of their bodies. Canadians will not tolerate compulsory military training or any approach to conscription, but the military problems of the country will be much easier of solution if the physical standard of the people can be raised. The rudiments of military training may be imparted under the system which Sir Frederick Borden is advocating without the suggestion of militarism, which is repugnant to the ideas of many worthy citizens.

A Forestry Convention.

An official summons has been issued by Sir Wilfrid Laurier for a Canadian forestry convention at Ottawa on Jan. 10, 11 and 12. In his communication to the public the Premier points out that Canada possesses one of the largest areas of virgin forest of any country in the world, and is ranked first, of the important sources of the world's timber supply for the future. The preservation of the streams in perennial and constant flow, which is largely controlled by the forests on the watersheds, will have an important influence on the industrial and agricultural development of the Dominion. The expansion of our electrical and mechanical industries will be regulated to a great extent by water, which forms the greatest source of power in all countries, and some of our western districts are dependent on irrigation to insure the success of agricultural operations. In all the older provinces the clearing of the soil has been carried to such an extent that the ill-effects on the water supply and on agriculture are clearly marked, while in the western prairies the need of sheltering trees for houses and fields is seriously felt by the settlers. The early construction of the Transcontinental Railway, and of other railways, through our northern forested districts and the consequent opening of those districts to general traffic, will increase the danger from fire which has already been a most active agent of destruction. These conditions are not new; they have from time to time received public attention, and during the session just closed, Parliament authorized the summoning of a convention for the more thorough discussion of the same. Those who are especially invited to the convention are members of the Senate, House of Commons and Provincial Legislatures, and representatives of the boards of trade, lumbermen's associations, universities, farmers' institutes, agricultural colleges, railway companies, fish and game commissions, and mining and civil engineers' societies. The subjects to be considered will be discussed under the following divisions:

1. The nation and the forest.
2. Forestry in relation to agriculture and irrigation.
3. The forest and the lumber and pulp industries.
4. The relation of our forests to other industries: railways, water powers, mining, building trades, wood-working manufactures.
5. Scientific forestry and forestry education.

THE PEACE CONFERENCE
 Germany Expected to Oppose Any Suggestion of Disarmament.

Berlin, Oct. 10. — The foreign office says Germany will accept Russia's invitation to attend the second peace conference at The Hague on the condition that the points to be discussed shall be arranged in advance by an interchange of communications among the powers so that the objects of the conference may be defined with precision, thus avoiding questions upon which any power has reservations.

Germany naturally will wish the question of disarmament to be off the programme as one which cannot lead to a practical agreement.

Great Britain, it is also pointed out, has a special position on certain neutrality practices, such as the length of time a belligerent may stay and coal in a neutral port.

The acceptance of Germany's suggestion will probably delay the assembling of the delegates meet, and it is believed that the participating countries will thus be able to avoid embarrassing situations.

FARMER SWINDLED BY MODERN WITCH

"Driving Out the Devil" Costly Cure for a Superstitious German Farmer.

Berlin, Oct. 9.—The trial at Erfurt of a so-called "wise woman" for frauding a rich farmer and his family brought to light an extraordinary case of superstition.

The farmer, who owns a large estate near Naegelsdorf, six years ago met with some ill-luck, and at once concluded that he was "possessed by the devil." The "wise woman" of Langensalz, who was consulted, confirmed this belief, and was requested by the farmer to relieve him of the evil one.

She went about it with many ceremonies, which culminated in the burial of a small amount of money in the earth at dead of night of an ordinary new pot, in which the farmer had previously placed a considerable amount of money. After the pot was buried the farmer, his family and the "wise woman" retired some distance and waited.

Suddenly there came a slight flash and a little explosion on the spot where the money was buried. The peasants were awestricken, and the "wise woman" at once declared: "There goes the devil. He took your money, and you have got rid of him."

The farmer said at the trial that he felt relieved after this occurrence for some time, when the devil took possession of him again. This time a larger sum was needed to conjure the fiend, and in this manner the woman continued to defraud the farmer for six years, during which time she received him of \$25,500. She had five accomplices, who helped her to dupe the superstitious people in the vicinity of Langensalz, from whom they extracted with all her lovers, she corresponded with all her lovers.

The affair had been going on several months when Mlle. Korner decided upon a bold bid for matrimony. She invited her 11 lovers to call upon her at the same hour on the same day, intending to throw herself on their mercy in the hope of finding one who would be willing to marry her.

A hitch occurred in her plans, however, as she was unable to send her presents away on an excursion, on which she had counted, and later the 11 lovers arrived from various parts to claim their fiancée, to the great astonishment and anger of Mlle. Korner's parents.

The girl was obliged to explain the situation, and her lovers, who took the news in good part, departed. It is believed the girl's mind is unshaken.

TO END CLUB GAMBLING
 High Stakes and Heavy Losses Cause Older Members to Protest.

London, Oct. 9.—White's Club, in St. James street, one of the most historic institutions in smart clubland, has landed in a serious crisis over the gambling which has been going on there since the summer of 1904.

Later on a young English swell, barely 21, and a whole year's allowance dropped \$50,000 in one afternoon's sitting. The King intervened, and directed that the club should be discontinued by the committee, but most serious with the body was quite ineffectual.
