BRITISH SUFFERED

Enormous Losses Sustaired by Englishmen in Odessa.

New York, Nov. 6 .- A special cable dispatch from St. Petersburg to the Times, says that the recent outrages at Tomsk and Tver and especially those at Odessa are to be investigated. At Odessa British subjects have suffered enormous losses. There can be no longer the slightest doubt that the main source of the danger to life and property lies, not in

the revolutionaries, but in the mobs instigated by the police and reactionaries.
