> "Pure water is better than purified water, that is certain," said Dr. Robinson, superintendent of the London come. Asylum, yesterday. "I am in favor of spring water in preference to filtered water.'

"I am not very conversant with your water problems, but I fancy they be cleaned out at least once a month are not much different from those in other places."

Situation in Guelph.

"In Guelph we had to face the proposition. We had been using filterel water from the river, and it was whether to install a better and more expensive filtration plant, or find something different. "It was discovered that there was

good supply of spring water at some distance from Guelph, and it was decided to take this in. This was done, and now Guelph has an ample supply of good water. The initial cost of the spring plant was considerably in excess of the filtration plant, but it was thought preferable. The operating expenses are not nearly so large.

Plenty of Spring Water.
