Canadians should be thankful that the Dominion Government refused to listen to the suggestion that it should formally demand a preference for Canadian products in the British the political crisis in Great Britain, ther says: The British tariff reformers would have been able to claim, with some plausibility, that they had the moral support of the Canadian Parliament and people. Canada would be a makeweight for the House of Lords in its intolerable pretensions, and would incur the reproach of the progressive elements in the mother country.

The issues raised in the British elections do not remotely touch party controversies in this country. Canadians are free to view the struggle from the standpoint of their individual opinions or prejudices. There is evidence that the great majority of them, Liberal and Conservative, are in sympathy with the programme of the present British Government, and hope that the power of the House of Lords will be curtailed, because the peers are the defenders of land monopoly and other the Canadian people in favor of the sincere and well-grounded. House of Lords, for no apparent reason except that the opposing parties in Great Britain are labelled Conservative and Liberal. The Montreal Star insults the intelligence of its readers by the suggestion that the tie between Canada and the mother country will be weakened by a victory for the British Government. 
### SUPREME COURT APPEALS
