Mayor Beattle and Chief Williams eceived instructions yesterday afternoon from Ottawa to see that all dogs in this city are either muzzled or tied ap, under penalty of a fine of \$200. The order is signed by J. G. Rutherford, veterinary director-general for Canada, and George F. O'Halloran, deputy minister of agriculture.

The Order. It states that: "In view of the fact that rabies is known to exist in many widely separated districts of Western Ontario, lying west of the eastern boundaries of the counties of York and Simcoe, that all dogs within that area must be securely chained in an outhouse, kept under lock and key, or else must be constantly muzzled with a metallic muzzle satisfactory to veterinary inspector of the district." In all districts where rabies is

known to exist, the muzzling privilege is not allowed, and all dogs must be chained or kept under lock and key. The Penalty. any violation of this order penalty of \$200 shall be exacted, and any person who impedes or obstructs an officer in performance of his duty

THE DOG LAW IN A NUTSHELL

If you own a dog you must muzzle him, chain him up, or keep him under lock and key. If you do not, you are liable to a fine of \$200, and the dog may be killed. If you harbor a dog which you do not own, you are liable to the fine, the same as if you owned the animal, and did not comply with the law. If a dog is allowed around your place, he must be muzzled, chained up or kept under lock and key, or you will pay the penalty. There have been many so-called mad dogs in Western Ontario, but according to local doctors, a dog in a fit is usually declared to be mad. It is frequently the case that a dog which has been poisoned by someone is seen in a fit, and then the mad dog cry is raised. However, the order has been issued, and the people of London and twenty-three counties in Western Ontario must abide by the consequences.
