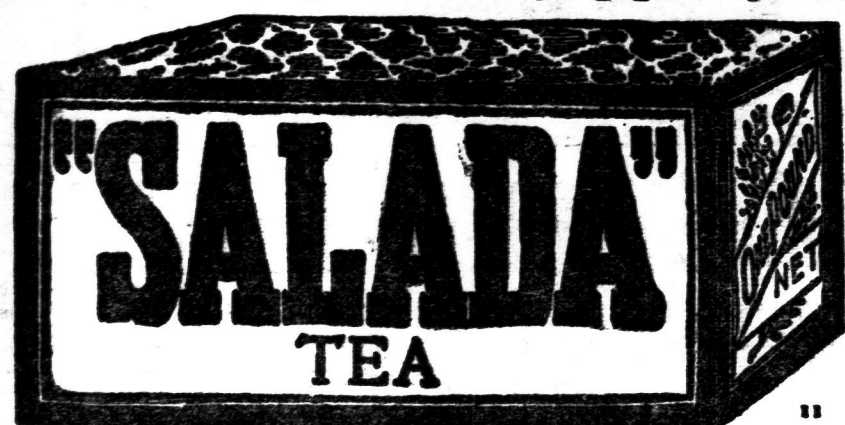

Three of their comrades were saved through heroism of other firemen. The bodies of the six men were found after the debris cooled. Many other firemen were fearfully burned, but remained at work. The dead are: Captain C. L. Chapman, Lieut. William J. Doherty, Lieut. John Buckles, Lieut. James T. Cullen, James Mortell, Thomas J. McGrath, of engine company No. 1.

REV. T. T. SHIELDS GOES TO TORONTO

Pastor of Adelaide Street Baptist Church Made the Announcement Last Night.

SAYS IT'S CALL OF GOD

Will Leave London in Four Weeks—Letter Read Last Night at Meeting in the Church.

At a very largely attended meeting of the congregation of the Adelaide Street Baptist Church last night, Rev. T. T. Shields announced that he had decided to accept the call to the pastorate of the Jarvis Street Baptist Church in Toronto.

Mr. Shields stated that he had been asked by the Jarvis Street congregation to commence his work on May 13, and he requested the Adelaide Street congregation to release him on May 8. Mr. Shields has been pastor of the Adelaide Street Church for nearly six years.

At last night's meeting he read the following letter:

The Pastor of the Adelaide Street Baptist Church, London, Ont.

My Dear Friends:—You all will have read in the daily papers that I have been called to the pastorate of the Jarvis Street Church, Toronto. You all are aware of the large opportunity for the ministry of the Word of God in the Jarvis Street pulpit affords, and you will quite readily understand how attractive to me is this call to larger service. I feel, however, that our relations as pastor and people for these five years and eight months have been so exceedingly happy, and our united labor has been fraught with such large spiritual blessing, that I owe it to you and to myself to assure you that nothing but the clearest indication that such is the divine will could lead me to bring about a severance of our present relationship.

"The Call of God."

"I have received a very large number of letters from prominent members of the Jarvis Street Church, and nearly every letter is expressive of a profound conviction that their call is the call of God. Time and again I should fully explain in what a remarkable way the pulpit committee was led to think of me without any suggestion on my part, and I am informed that 'every single member of that committee was enthusiastically agreeable' to the committee's recommendation to the church. "In addition to the many letters received from the members of Jarvis Street Church, several of the university professors, and a considerable number of prominent pastors, have written me, all of them expressing the hope that I may be led to accept the Jarvis Street call.

Decides to Leave.

"Having taken all these things into consideration, it has appeared to me that it is unlikely that all these friends should be mistaken in their conviction as to the divine will. I have, therefore, decided to leave London for Toronto. "I therefore hereby resign the pastorate of the Adelaide Street Church, and ask you to release me after Sunday, the 8th of May, in order that I may comply with the request of the Jarvis Street Church and begin my pastorate in Toronto on Sunday, May 15th.

Friends in London.

"But while I thus ask you to consent to the severance of our present relationship, I cannot forbear to express for Mrs. Shields and myself our deep and lasting affection for the dear friends in Adelaide Street Church, with whom we have lived and labored so happily for nearly five years. "No pastor could desire a more faithful staff of officers than I have had, and the officers of few churches may reasonably hope to be more generally and genuinely loved than we have been by the members of the Adelaide Street Church.

Leaves in Four Weeks.

"I shall relinquish the pastorate of this church in four weeks time with deep regret and with profound gratitude to God for the privilege of the acquaintance and fellowship of its loyal and zealous members. The uniform kindness which the Adelaide Street Church has shown us, will, by Mrs. Shields and myself, never be forgotten in our memories, and reckoned as no small part of the goodness and mercy which thus far have followed us through life. "Allow me in conclusion to impress upon your minds the necessity for much prayer that the Great Head of the Church may direct you in the success of my successor, and to assure you of my conviction that He who walks in the midst of the golden candlesticks and holds the stars in His right hand will surely send you a pastor who will come in the fullness of the blessing of the Gospel of Christ. For this we will pray. Yours affectionately, T. T. SHIELDS. "After many kind words for Mr. and Mrs. Shields, and heartfelt expressions of regret at severing the helpful and inspiring relationship that existed between them and the church for nearly six years, the pastor's resignation was formally accepted.

THE WALTZ MARATHON

The last five minutes of the hour's race was very close, but Morrissey and Dunn passed wire half a lap ahead. They had covered five miles in the hour.
