Canadians Are Opposed, Says Mr. Bowyer, M. P. P., to Dreadnoughts or Grants.

A recent issue of the Ridgetown Dominion, edited by Mr. P. Bowyer, a Conservative member of the Ontario Legislature, contains the following editorial:

"Firmly believing that it is best for Canada to continue its connection with the mother country, and that it should bear a fair share in the defence of the empire of which it forms a part, the Dominion has favored, and still favors, direct annual contribution to Great The Famous War Correspondent Britain in preference to a Canadian navy of any kind. While this is our position on the navy question, we must honestly admit that having made searching inquiry among the people of this section we find that only a small minority agree with us. The great majority are not only opposed to a Canadian navy on the Laurier plan. but are also opposed to building Dreadnoughts or giving money. They are quite content that the present relations continue, but are opposed to doing anything. This attitude, while in our opinion regrettable, nevertheless is that of the scores of men, embracing all shades of political opinion, with whom we have discussed the question. Hamilton, Nov. 16 .- A year ago beef was selling on the wholesale market for 10½ cents and today it can be bought at prices ranging from 81/2 to 91/2 cents. Live dressed pork is cheaper today than a few months ago, being offered for 7 cents, a drop of 3 cents, which is considered a good sign. Lamb is also cheaper selling for from 10 to 12 cents, or about 2 cents less than last year. Veal, however, remains at a ton-notch price and it is difficult to get it even for 12 cents. Poultry has also fallen, and although it has still a long distance to drop to reach the figures of years past, it is selling today for 20 per cent. less than
