HOME RULE BILL WAS REJECTED IN HOUSE OF LORDS

Crisis Started As Result of Uncompromising Attitude of Both Sides.

Lord Curzon's Speech Thought To Be Highly Significant by Daily News.

London, July 16. - The House of Lords, by a majority of 238 for the second time in six months rejected the home rule bill.

The result was a foregone conclusion, but, says the London Daily Sews (Liberal) today, has nevertheless inaugurated a serious crisis between the two Houses. On the one hand, Lord Curzon with-

drew what he understood to be Lord Lansdowne's promise yesterday to accept the home rule bill if a general election were won upon it. On the other hand the Prime Minister in the House of Commons announced definitely that the Lords abolition bill will be tabled at the next session. The challenge on both sides, says the London Daily News, is complete and uncompromising.

The importance of Lord Curzon's, peech lies in the fact that for a whole afternoon he was in close consultation with Lord Lansdowne, who drafted what appeared to be an ultimatum to the Government.
