The cheese was of good Canadian make and contained a compass and map. That was all that was needed. On the inside of an envelope he wrote his request, a letter in itself, but it escaped the eye of the German censor. This was the secret message, written in a very small hand: "Last fall another fellow and I escaped and when taken were almost to the Black forest, which stretches up to Switzerland. We were gone five nights and traveling all the hours of darkness and were only taken by an accident. This coming summer I am going to try it again. When taken I lost my compass, maps and German money, having any one of which is a crime here. In the bottom of a bag of sugar send me a comwhich is a crime here.
