GERMANS WILL REFUSE TO TAKE INTO CUSTODY THOSE WANTED BY ALLIES FOR CRIMES DURING WAR

Note Is Sent by Berlin Government to Entente Powers Asking a Revision of Clauses of Versailles Treaty That Call For Extradition and Trial of German War Criminals.

Berlin, Jan. 28.—Indication of the government's growing concern over the extradition of Germans accused of war offences was given in the acts sent to the Allies today, asking revision of clauses of the Versailles treaty. The attempted assassination of Mathias Brzberger, minister of finance, last Monday, is viewed in official circles as a precursor of what is likely to happen on a larger scale if the government, yielding to the Allies, appeals to force in arresting men on the list submitted by the Entente Powers.

The note to the Allies, which will not be published in Germany, warns the Entente Powers that Germany cannot assume she is able to compel either national or local agencies of the law to lay hands on the men wauted and transfer them to German frontiers. The Associated Press is informed that even

Maintain That Continuance of Conflict Is Inexcusable.

WARNING IS ISSUED

Heads of Labor Party Declare Foreign Policy Is All Wrong.

London, Jan. 29.-Complete and immediate peace for soviet Russia is deby eighteen prominent labor leaders, including John Robert Clynes, former food controller; James Henry Thomas, general secretary of the national union of railway men, and William Brace,

The signatories assert that they "do not subscribe to the political social theories on which the Soviet Government is based," but contend that a continu is based," but contend that a continu ance of the state of war is inexcusable, and that the course of least risk found is peace. They maintain that if the Soviet Government is merely imposing its power on the Russian people by tyranny, it is believed that the people are cowed by privation and hunger, and that those conditions will be perpetuated by a state of war, the horrors of which will fall, not upon the tyrannical government, but upon the peasants, women and children. The manifesto denounces "the intrigues" of the great powers and their "proposal to use alien satellite armies to prosecute a war which their own soldiers have refused to wage"—incicating among the "satellites" Japan and Poland.

London, Jan. 23.—An agreement of all the principal points at issue has been reached between the Italian Cabinet and the leaders of the striking rallwaymen, according to a Central News dispatch from Rome under Wednesday's date.
