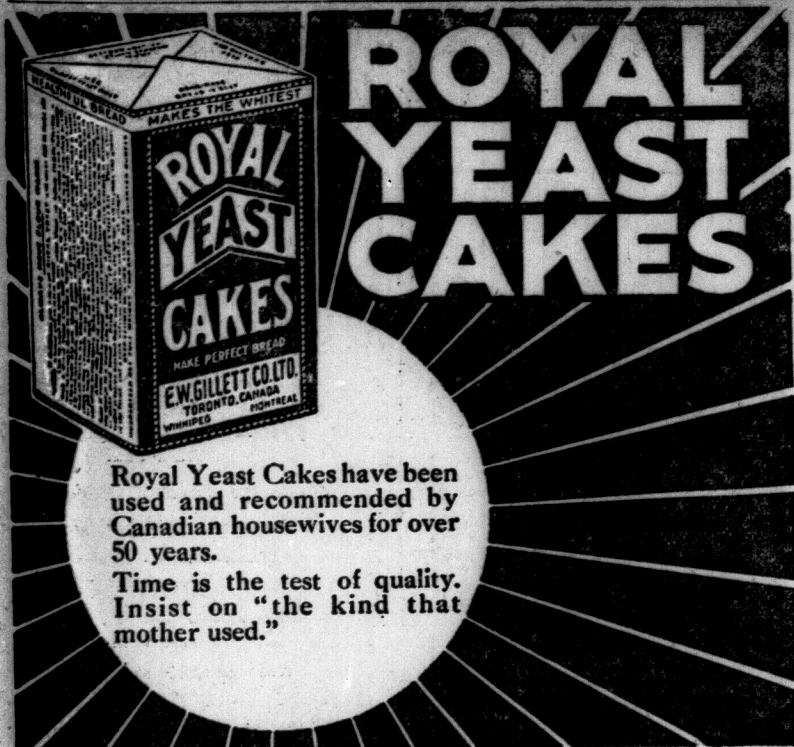

BON TON PROVES FINE BURLESQUE ENTERTAINMENT

John Barry & Company Present
Clever, Peppy and Amusing Show.

RANKED AMONG BEST

John Barry with the Bon Tons, the Columbia burlesque attraction which opened a three days' engagement at the Grand Opera House yesterday with matinee and evening performances to crowded houses, present what can safely be ranked among the best burlesque combinations seen here this season. It is well named "Bon Ton," for it represents practically the height of the various divisions of this sort of entertainment. Liberal applause indicated that the audiences also held this opinion.

Opening with a scene in a club, which serves to introduce a double quartet with a tenor who can really sing, in the person of Walter LaFoye, the scene serves to introduce the chorines and the three female principals, Misses La Barr, Wright and Barry, in several numbers, of which "Wine, Women and Song" was the most heartily received.

Sandy Ackland, the inimitable Scotch comedian, who, when he appeared in vaudeville at the Grand some time ago, practically "stopped the show" with his comedy, songs and bag-piping, came near to repeating the trick.

In song and comedy he is Lauder-esque while his imitation of a bag-piper after a sojourn in the "bunny" Highland is one of the funniest items presented here on any program. He is also a dancer of no mean ability and altogether his contributions to the evening's entertainment are of high-class.

Burglar Sketch.—A laughable burglar sketch, and one of the usual lingerie shop numbers introduced several hits including "Dig a Little Deeper," very well done by Miss Wright and chorines. The scene was introduced by Mr. Barry, Mr. Raynor, Miss Barry, Miss La Barr, Mr. Ackland, Mr. Simmons and Mr. LaFoye introduces "Annabelle" by Mr. Ackland and chorine with a line of swift peppy comedy.

The chief of police sketch gives Mr. Barry an excellent opportunity. His comedy in this is funny in the extreme, while his satirical references to the various laws through which the sale of intoxicants has been largely relegated to the bootlegger seemed to strike a responsive chord in the audience, for the applause was loud and long.

The closing scene of the first act, "The Palace of Jewels" is one of the most elaborate staged here and serves to introduce a line of costumes new to London and decidedly attractive and fetching.

Frozen North.—The second act opens in the Frozen North with the girls attractively costumed as Eskimo maidens, pretty scenic investiture, good lighting effects and brilliant pictures. Miss Wright's rendering of blues songs is extremely clever, she being forced to respond to several encores. Then the scene changes to a chorus dressing room in which the atmosphere is well preserved and the numbers clever and well done.

The original Chicago jazz band is then heard in a succession of numbers, jazzier, swifter and more melodious than presented by any similar organization during this season. Again the applause was long and loud, the talented aggregation scoring a distinct hit.

The principals of the company are all good. Barry is an unctuous comedian, whose facial expressions and lines are very funny. He is ably assisted by Mr. Raynor, Sandy Ackland, and the others mentioned in a class by him self. Miss La Barr is one of the daintiest, prettiest little sopranos seen here this season, and she has a sweet soprano voice which while not of great range or power carries a pretty appeal. Miss Wright is clever in her song renditions, and her acting, while peppy personality stand out in Miss Barry's every appearance.

The chorus is shapely, pretty and hard-working, while the wardrobe carried is among the most elaborate of the season. A clean, up-to-date, peppy show, well staged and presented, and providing two and one-half hours of big show value for the money. VESSELS MAY LOAD GRAIN FOR STORAGE

Ottawa Stipulates U. S. Boats Must Unload in Canadian Ports.

Ottawa, Nov. 26.—United States vessels may now load grain at Port William for winter storage conditional on such grain being unloaded at a Canadian port next spring. The following telegram has been sent to the collector of customs at Port William by the commissioner of customs here: "Am directed to instruct you that United States vessels may load grain for winter storage at your port, conditional on unloading of such cargoes at Canadian ports on the opening of navigation next spring. A written understanding should be obtained in each case from shippers of grain and vessel owners to unload such grain at Canadian ports next spring."

It has been the custom to permit American vessels to load Canadian grain for winter storage.

BROCKVILLE COW MAKES A REMARKABLE SHOWING

Brockville, Nov. 26.—A record for seven days' milk and butter production combined, exceeded by but two other Holstein cows in Canada, has just been completed by 8-year-old Queen Beulah, owned by H. A. Clark, M.L.A., which has produced during that period 37.3 pounds of milk and 27.25 pounds of butter. The animal is proceeding to a 365-day test.

LOEW'S THEATRE VAUDEVILLE BILL IS OF HIGH ORDER

Film Feature, "Pleasure Mad," Lavish Production, Possessing Individuality.

PRINCIPALS EXCEL

As though to sweeten somewhat the acid pill of increased prices, the bill at Loew's just now is rather notably good. The three-cent increase in prices was observed locally with alarm, but once at the wicket the bother of coppers in the change is eliminated, and the extra pennies don't seem so exorbitant, when it is remembered that the wicket is included. With something of the peculiarity commonly attributed to the ostrich, the public can derive meagre satisfaction from the thinking that the theatre management is forced to part with the aforementioned tax.

The vaudeville turns commence right smartly with "The Three Palcons." Acrobatic ability is certainly not lacking on the part of these performers, but it is a question which pleased the crowd more, their stunts or the embellishments of humor provided by the youth in the Eton jacket. The act finishes as smartly as it commences.

The Four Caledonians have allowed their comic interludes to become rusty with age, but their singing is excellent. It brought them in for a double encore at the performances yesterday.

Voices Pleasing.—The concluding act is called simply "Pleasure Mad," the film feature, is a version of "The Three Palcons," a well-known novel by Blanche Upright, and which has to do with the struggle of a mother to retain a hold upon her family when a sudden transition to wealth knocks both husband and children dizzy with its riotous splendor. It gives Mary Alden an opportunity to create another of the mother roles which have made her famous. And it gives ample opportunity also for a display of that lavishment of production in which the newer moving picture features seem to excel.

The titles at times are tinged with a slightly vapid sentiment, but by means of a capable portrayal of each role, the emotional theme of the story has been well-developed.

Has Individuality.—The story of the man of forty who awakes one day to the realization that his faithful wife, who is also forty, does not understand him, is a common enough one, but in "Pleasure Mad" it does take on a little individuality, and this chiefly by virtue of the acting of the principals, rather than any construction of the narrative.

Norma Shearer, who plays the daughter, is one of the newer arrivals in the films, having an arresting and pleasant beauty as well as a capability which shows to advantage in this picture.

Another of the "Fighting Blood" series in which Gale sustains his first professional battle, and the Pathe weekly, complete the bill.

ALD. JOHN GREER CLAIMS BYLAW WORDING BIASED

City Council Printing Committee Meeting Brings Out Warm Argument.

PHRASES DELETED

Members of the special "printing" committee of the city council assembled yesterday afternoon and "rehashed" generally the respective merits of the new city hall question. Ald. John Greer, ward one aspirant, took decided exception to the wording of the advertisements of the bylaw at issue and refused to be a party to what he characterized as "biased" publicity.

After a 15-minute debate the committee compromised and proposed "ads" were approved with certain revisions. For instance the committee was not unanimous that the phrase, "Let's go," was necessary, and it was struck out although Mayor Wenige moved that the "ad" be approved as read. "Sweep your own door-step" also failed to meet with general approval, while Ald. Greer suggested that they dispense with "Work for London labor."

Ald. Leonard Douglass, chairman of the board of works, objected to the form in which it was proposed to send the ballot to the people, when the interesting fact was disclosed that as yet no provision had been made to tell definitely where it was proposed to build the hall. "It will only lead to further trouble," he warned.

Maintains Stand.

Ald. John Greer declared point-blank that he would not be a party to any biased appeals to the electors. "As I have opposed all year the building of a city hall on the McCormick site at this time you would hardly expect me to support a proposal like this to practically 'sell' the proposition to the people."

Mayor Wenige contended that the "ads" were not biased and recalled that the council had approved of the construction of a hall on the McCormick site.

Ald. Greer suggested that they eliminate the phrase in effect, "make work for Londoners."

"What are you going to do then, bring in outside labor?" asked the mayor.

"Don't be foolish," admonished Ald. Greer.

The remark was made during the conclusion that, while Mayor Wenige had been dealing with the city hall question fairly from the public platform during the present campaign, his proposed "ads" were biased.

"No person can object to what I say on the public platform," his worship asserted vigorously, "and what is more I'll have more to say before this is over and I'll say it a good deal stronger. I have a mandate in my pocket from 63,000 people of this city."

Questions Plan.

Mayor Wenige pointed out also that it was Ald. Greer who had moved that the city hall "ad" be inserted in the papers; but Ald. Greer objected that when he did so he was under the impression that the ratepayers were to be supplied with the facts and were not to be influenced.

Ald. Frank McKay questioned whether it was legal for the council to charge the cost of this publicity to the city hall account, and City Treasurer James Bell replied that this would have no hesitation in doing so. It had been done in many other instances, he pointed out.

Ald. Douglass urged that the people be told that the construction of a dam at Springbank would hasten the need for a new sewer disposal system at a cost of \$400,000. City Engineer Near McDougall declared that this undertaking would be imperative if the river was to be fit for boating, bathing, etc., after the dam was constructed.

REPORT STATES WHEAT IS IN GOOD CONDITION

Toronto, Nov. 26.—The acreage of fall plowing done this year is well up to the average, and farmers are willing to take advantage of any further open weather to extend the area turned under, says the report of the Ontario department of agriculture today.

Fall wheat continues to have a fine appearance for entering the winter. The fine weather of the last few weeks had made it possible for farmers to let livestock run on pasture somewhat later than usual in the past few districts, and unless considerable snow comes, many horses and cattle may be left on for a while longer.

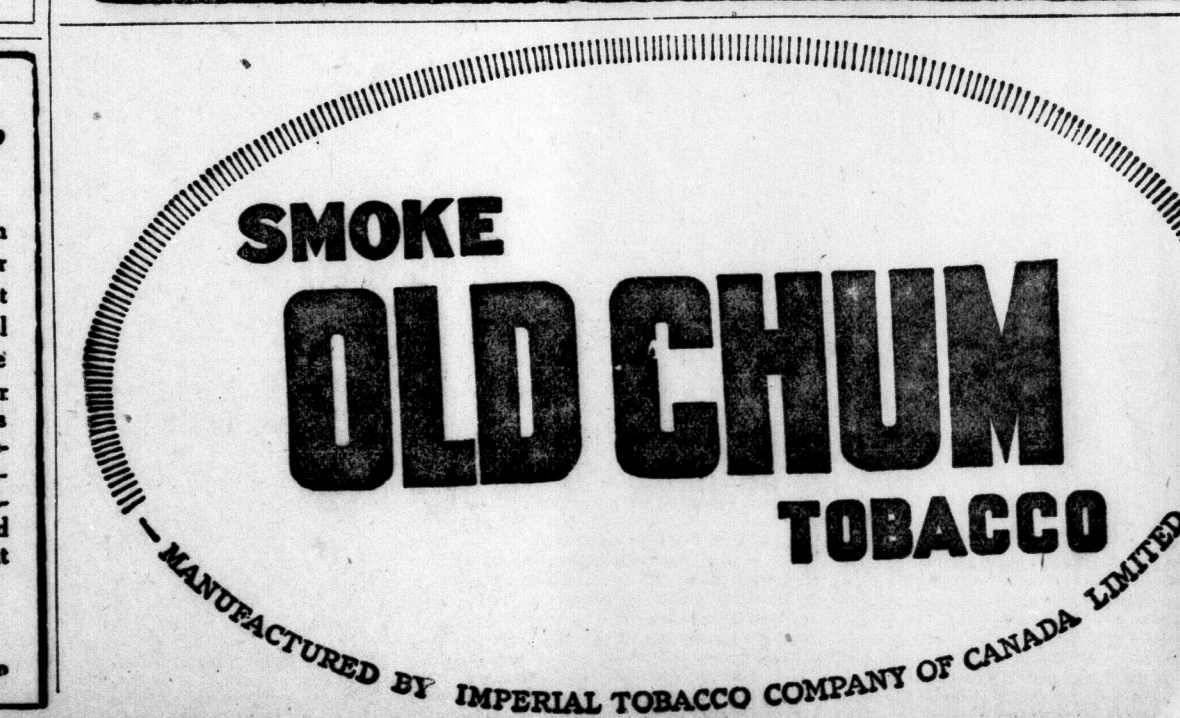

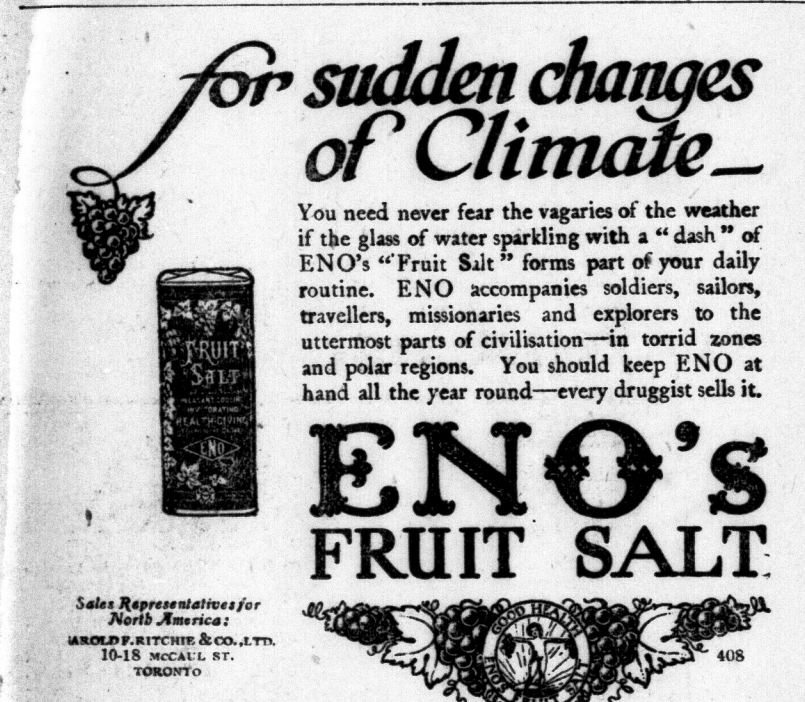

MINE EXPLOSION TAKES TWO LIVES

Blast Near Benton, Illinois, Caused by Gases Collecting in Shafts.

Chicago, Nov. 26.—Two men were killed today and thirteen were burned, two of them seriously, in an explosion in the Orelint mine of the Chicago, Wilmington and Franklin Coal Company near Benton, Ill., according to advices to the coal company's officials here tonight.

The mine, one of the largest in the world, employs more than 1,000 men, and 920 were reported to have been in the mine at the time of the explosion which was believed due to gases.

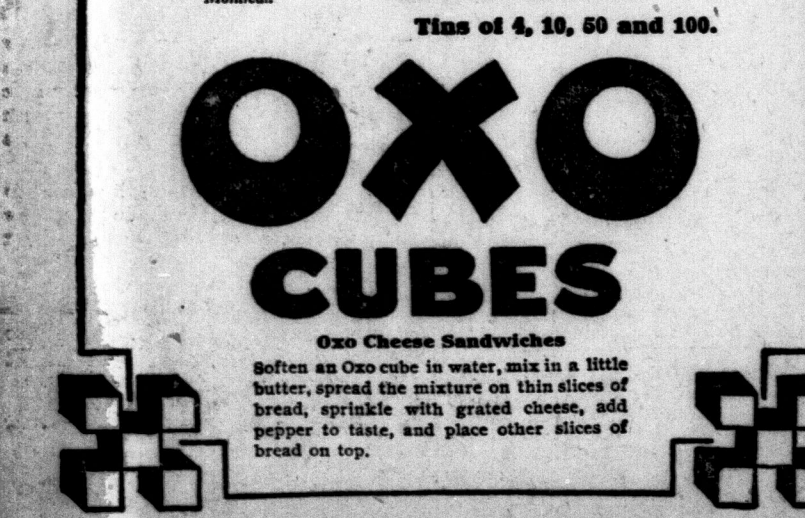
