

PARTY BELIEVED LOST ON ICE RETURNS TO MAINLAND

ICE BOAT PARTY FOUGHT FOR HOURS TO REACH ISLAND

Guy McCormick and Son Relate Terrible Tale of Hardships On Two-Mile Trip.

FLOES ARE DRIFTING

Windsor, Feb. 11.—Guy McCormick, his son Harry, and William Lidwell, three members of the party believed to have been lost between Point Pelee and Pelee Island in attempting to reach the island Thursday, arrived back at the Point shortly before noon today with a tale of terrible hardship.

All the other members of the party are safe on the island. Guy McCormick, who was in charge of the two boats, stated:

Ordinarily the two-mile trip to the island takes about two hours, but it was nearly nine hours after they left the Point that the party reached their destination late Thursday night. Since that time drifting ice has made it impossible to return to the mainland until this morning.

Mr. McCormick said that the people in the boats were entirely unaware of the anxiety they had caused in Leamington and the surrounding district. Radio messages broadcasted had not been received by them, and he was greatly surprised to find that they had been believed lost.

He said the trip to the island was one of the worst he has ever made. At times the little boats were driven miles out of their course by the wind and the drifting floes of ice, which impeded the progress of the tiny craft, but never at any time were the occupants alarmed by the prospect of not reaching the island.

London, Feb. 11.—Doubt as to whether the Prince of Wales would ever ascend the throne was expressed by Miss Minnie Pallister, election agent to Premier Ramsay MacDonald in Aberavon in the recent general election, in a speech which Miss Pallister made at Bradford yesterday.

Miss Pallister said the doubt in the matter of the Prince of Wales succeeding his father as king was not due to any objection on the part of the country to the personality either of King George or the prince, but it was due to the "country growing up and seeing the old institution sloughing off."

She expressed the view that the sloughing off process might carry with it the monarchy of Great Britain at no distant date.

BOY SERIOUSLY HURT BY FALL ON PITCHFORK

Jack Stebb, Rodney, Admitted to St. Joseph's Hospital Following Accident Saturday.

His stomach penetrated by the prongs of a pitchfork, Jack Stebb, a 12-year-old Rodney boy was admitted to St. Joseph's Hospital Saturday evening suffering from serious injuries.

The lad was operated on by Dr. W. J. Stevenson almost immediately. He fell from the top of a haystack upon the upturned pitchfork a distance of 10 feet, the prongs going through the abdomen and puncturing the inner wall. Dr. Dorland of Rodney was summoned and gave the youngster first aid.

Following the operation Stebb was inoculated with anti-toxin to guard against complications. He is being kept under local anesthetics owing to the severe pain.

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WHISKEY IN 'HOMES' REEVE GETS BUSY

J. W. Laidlaw of Westminster Looking Into Alcohol Consumption in Institutions.

Although the committee appointed by the county council to delve into the question of liquor consumption at the House of Refuge, Strathroy, has had no official meeting, it is known that some members of the committee have been quietly at work gathering "statistics" on the amount of whiskey consumed at institutions of a similar nature.

These members ascertained, for example, that there was very little whiskey used by patients at the Home for Incurables and the Aged People's Home, and they want to ascertain, if possible, why it has been found necessary to buy so much whiskey for the patients who go to make up the population at the Strathroy home.

J. W. Laidlaw, reeve of Westminster Township, who is chairman of the investigation committee, stated today that there was nothing for publication. He would not say where or when the committee would meet.

WILL CONSIDER ESTIMATES.
Estimates for 1924 will be considered at a meeting of the board of health this evening.

BOARD OF WORKS ESTIMATES SHOW \$60,756 INCREASE

City Engineer Outlines Expenditure and Presents Figures For Year.

\$197,674 IS CALLED FOR
Estimates of the board of works for 1924, considered at a meeting of No. 2 committee this afternoon, showed an increase of \$62,756 over the amount expended last year.

City Engineer Near stated that the bulk of the increase was confined to three items—street cleaning, sewage, and care of unpaved streets. Last year's figures totalled \$134,918, while the estimates for this year call for an expenditure of \$197,674. Against this a surplus of \$3,500 can be placed, this amount being saved during 1923.

The largest item is that of street cleaning, flushing and sweeping, which in previous years had been paid for on a frontage basis. This year it is to be recommended that it be paid out of the general tax rate. The amount needed will be about \$45,000 of which the city pays \$12,000 in respect of street intersections and the frontage of public buildings.

This work this year is being considered as a general sanitary measure and should be paid for by the city as such, as a whole, according to Mr. Near.

The second largest item is for the care of unpaved streets. This calls for \$21,000 more than last year when only \$8,000 was set aside for this purpose, a ridiculous amount in the opinion of the city engineer, for looking after and maintaining some 100 miles of streets.

Sewage disposal will take care of another \$10,000, this work including the overhauling of the bacteria beds which have not been cleaned for some years. It is expected that this part of the work will cost about \$5,500.

Of the other standard items in the estimates, some have been decreased, others increased, but the net total is an increase over 1923.

AGRICULTURAL CLASSES GRANT IS FORWARDED

Secretary W. A. Tanner of the board of education received a check for \$20,233 this morning, the amount being a grant made by the government for the agricultural classes conducted in the public schools. The amount has been divided as follows: Boyle Memorial, \$37.35; Ealing, \$40; Lorne Avenue, \$40; Potteryburg, \$40; Riverview, \$60; Ryerson, \$40; Simcoe Street, \$60; St. George's, \$40; Tecumseh Avenue, \$34.70; Victoria, \$77.15; Wortley Road, \$40.

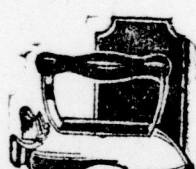

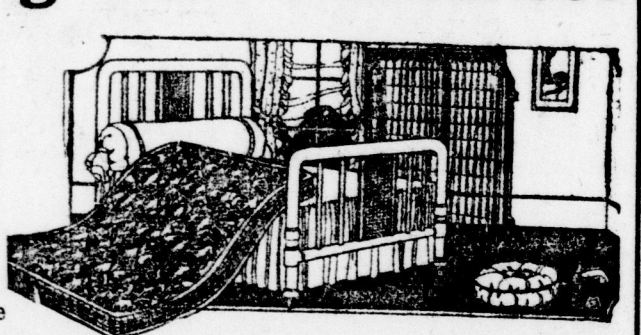

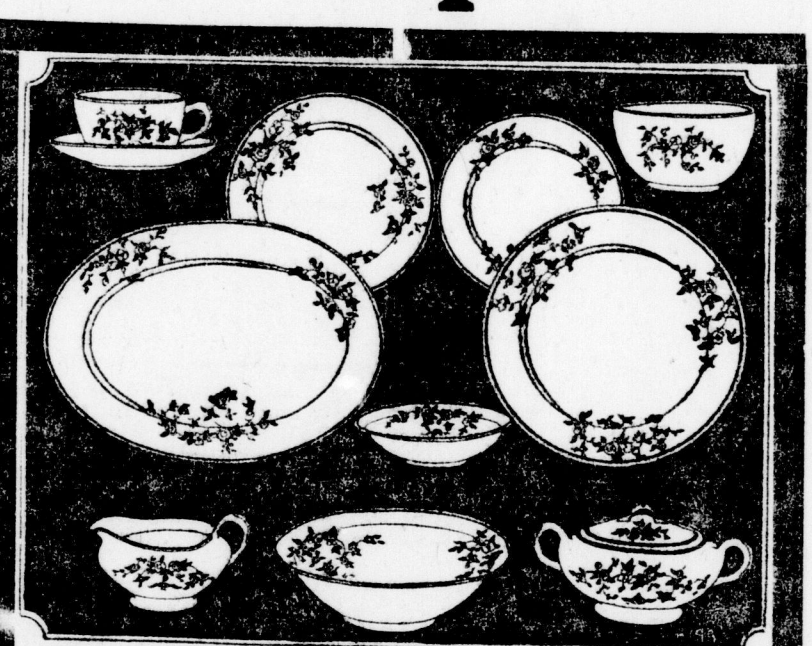
