

FEAR OF STARVATION

Is Not Yet Imminent in Dawson City According to Late News.

Skagway Will Soon Have a Newspaper to Cheer the Inhabitants.

The fear of starvation has for the present at least ceased to hover before the eyes of citizens of Dawson, for in a letter from that city dated as late as August 18, the good news is given that "a boat came in to-day with 450 tons, mostly grub, and another is following close behind."

This letter is from James Barlow, a former employee of Elford & Smith of this city, who left Victoria for the North on the 28th of May last. Exactly one month later he had reached Dawson, going in by the Stickeen river and Teelin lake, and then rafting down the river.

Two days afterwards he was at work at Elbow. It is only about a week since Mr. Barlow heard from him with an enclosure of "a week's wages"—\$100—and now he writes at greater length of the progress of affairs.

"I have made over \$600," he says, "and have never seen the mines yet, as I have never gone out of town. I am under cover all the time and have a first-class job, or 'yob,' as my Swedish friend would have it. When the next company boat comes up the foreman is going out, and I am then to have charge of the work, and won't have to lift a hand myself. Won't that be a snap?"

"There are a great many people coming in at present, mostly from Seattle—too many, indeed, for they are sure to overdo the thing. I think Seattle must be going crazy. Tell Harry it is much too early to look for gold, so I am going to stay with my job and then go mining after that."

"Dawson is as yet a city of tents, but they are fast turning them into log cabins. The company is also working, has three warehouses 30x100, two stores and 30x28 and two stories high—and the Alaska company has about the same. They were run out of almost everything this week, and many are now getting out as they came—without supplies. There are now about 3,000 people here, and more than 1,000 more they say on the way. I am sure to think that I came when I did, and wish I had been here sooner. There is a boat in to-day with 450 tons, mostly grub, and another is following close behind her. Fresh meat is in 75 cents a pound at present, and moose meat at that. Eight head of cattle have come down the river, but they will have to be fattened before they are butchered."

The P.-I. says: "The Skagway Times is the name of a newspaper that will make its appearance in the camp on the beach within the next three weeks unless the calculations of the projectors are wrong. The journalistic venture is being undertaken by Wm. L. LaFleur, a Victoria, who has started the 'First Bank of Skagway,' the safe for which was sent up on the Shirley. The men who will conduct the 'Skagway Times' are J. W. Troy and G. T. Ulmer, both of Port Angeles. Mr. Troy was formerly connected with the Democrat-Leader, of the sub-port on the clam beach down the strait, and for which Mr. Ulmer is to take up 100 head of cattle. Some lumber is also going up, and Mr. Ulmer says he may start a theatre at Skagway. The material for the newspaper office and the stock yards will be sent up to Skagway on a barge that will be towed by the tug boat Resolute, Saturday. Norman Smith, of Port Angeles, is to be the banker in charge of the 'First Bank of Skagway.'"

THE LOST "ALETTE."

Her Crew Even to Those Shipped at Vancouver Were Countrymen of the Captain.

Further particulars were received yesterday of the crew of the ill-fated ship Alette, wrecked off the coast of Japan. On arrival in Vancouver all the crew of fifteen, except the native Norwegians, deserted, and their places were supplied by the Norwegian vice-consul, Mr. J. C. MacLure, of Ward & Company. Those shipped from Vancouver were: C. Svenson, H. Olsen, Victor Carlsson, C. Lendstrom and S. Oleson—all well known by the sea-going men of British Columbia. When the ship arrived in Vancouver, Captain Lorentzen's wife, who was with him on the voyage, was in a delicate condition, and was sent home via the C. P.R. She had only reached home when the news of the Alette's loss reached her. The captain has the name of being a hard man to get along with, which accounts for the desertion of his crew. He was, however, a jolly man on shore, and made many friends here. On her last voyage his ship carried 1,044,259 feet of lumber from the Hastings mill.

SHIPS AND SHIPPING.

MR. MILES' CITY MINE.

Permission for its Development Will in All Probability Be Refused.

Even Should It Not, the Claim Does Not Promise Heavy Dividends.

At the next meeting of the Victoria Board of Aldermen, William Miles, the Alberni prospector who less than a week ago staked out a free gold claim in the very heart of the business section of this city, will formally apply for permission to develop his property according to the miner's definition of the term. That he will be successful in his application is very doubtful, for the same considerations that have thus far stood in the way of record being granted for the claim, again will intervene to his discomfort.

The gold is there unquestionably, but whether it would be either profitable or expedient to tear out the heart of the city in order to recover it is another question. Mr. Charles Hayward, who pointed the now famous ledge out to Miles, does not think so. If he had, he would have located the claim himself, and undertaken its prosecution. Here is what he says of the matter as it at present stands:

In regard to the mineral claim lately staked on Government street in this city, I hardly think that the necessary permission will be obtained to prospect the ledge. In fact, the power to be obtained, do I think it will prove remunerative, as the paystreak does not appear to be present in sufficient body.
