Dalhousie, Oct. 23.—The sixty rooms have already been applied for in the Inch Arran Hotel for the summer season of 1914 speaks well for this charming resort. Mr. John E. It contains over one hundred and forty large rooms and the dining room accommodates over two hundred guests. It is reached very easily by a delightful three-quarters of a mile drive from the town of Dalhousie and stands on promontory with water practically all around.

The tourist season next year will see our growing town considerably advanced in modern improvements and our town Council deserves credit for activity in taking progressive steps towards giving Dalhousie an up to electric plant to be followed by a policy of permanent sidewalks.

If we are to make our town attractive to the stranger and interesting to our own people, further steps should be taken in beautifying the place by the planting of trees on the sides of our wide streets.

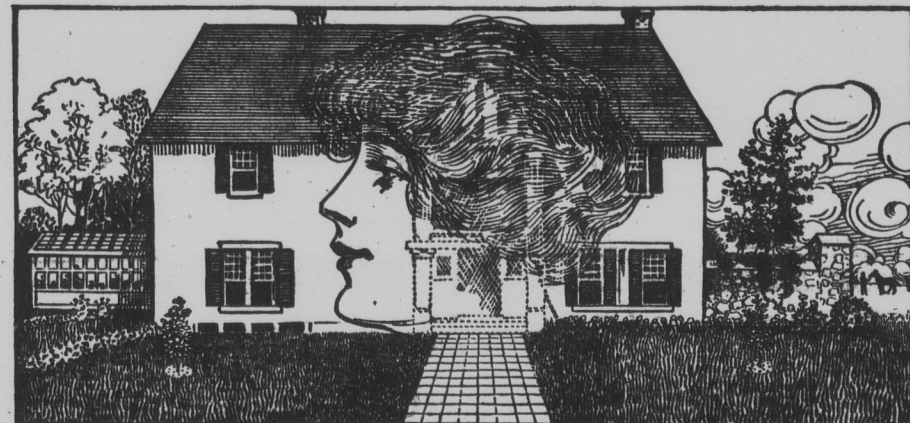


