CAMPBELLTON'S ELECTRIC LIGHT EXTENSION CAUSES TROUBLE

Municipalities Committee Threw Out Bill and Thus Threatened to Retard Campbellton's Growth and Seriously Hinder Present Industries

When it was learned last Friday that the Municipalities Committee of the Local Legislature had virtually thrown out the Town of Campbellton's bill asking for permission to issue \$50,000 for electric light and power extension, the citizens began to sit up and take notice. At the meeting of the Town Council held Saturday afternoon the matter was discussed, both before and during the session, and it was decided to send a delegation consisting of the Mayor and two or three Councilors to Fredericton to get at the bottom of the matter. On Monday a large meeting of citizens was held in the Curling rink when the matter was discussed from every angle and the delegates were asked for and met with a hearty response. About twenty delegates were sent to Fredericton. It was the generally expressed opinion that the condition of the present plant must have been grossly exaggerated or the Municipalities Committee would not have taken the action it did. The fact that the town's bill was unanimously referred back to the committee by the Legislature Tuesday afternoon shows conclusively that the members recognized that justice had not been done our town. At this writing the Graphic understands that the committee heard from town representatives and have recommended the bill to the Legislature for passing. The need of more electric power for Campbellton is recognized by every citizen. Last winter it was barely possible for our present plant to carry on, and since January 1st considerable new demands have been added. WORKMAN KILLED IN BATHURST MILL

Russian Pole was Caught in Fall of Logs and Instantly Killed

Bathurst, April 13.—A fatality occurred at the pulp mill recently, when Stephen Novik, a young Russian-Pole, who was working at the pulp mill, was caught in a sudden fall of logs and thrown against the carrier chain, which quickly crushed out his life. HOSPITAL DAY AT HOTEL DIEU

Preparations for National Hospital Day are Being Developed at Local Hospital

Preparations for National Hospital Day are being developed at the Hotel Dieu Hospital as well as at 5,000 hospitals throughout Canada and the United States. National Hospital Day is the day on which the hospitals of Canada and the United States and of other countries unite to give all the people a chance to learn what hospitals do and how they do it. An institution such as the Hotel Dieu Hospital is associated in the public mind with many things—medicine and the performing of operations and few stop to consider the great variety of problems and activities which must be handled on a business basis. Probably more different kinds of business are combined in the operation of a hospital than in any other field of endeavor. For instance the Hotel Dieu Hospital has a grocery and dry good stock. It has a registered pharmacy, an X-Ray and Pathological Laboratory. It maintains a culinary department serving 820 meals a day, a laundry turning out 1152 pieces a day, and a School of Nursing. All of these are smoothly and quietly running business enterprises, each quite necessary to the successful care of the sick. A few companions may help to visualize some of the supplies purchased; Butter: more than 2124 pounds of butter were purchased last year. Flour: 52 barrels. The people cared for last year numbered 1232, making approximately 12,320 days of service, and each of those days was twenty-four hours long. If measured in eight hour days last year's work would represent a little over 11 years service, including Sundays and holidays, and without vacations. Details of the program at the Hotel Dieu Hospital will be announced shortly, but in the meantime a cordial invitation is tendered to everybody to visit the Hospital May 12th.

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
