GOOD RESPONSE TO THE BELGIAN FUND

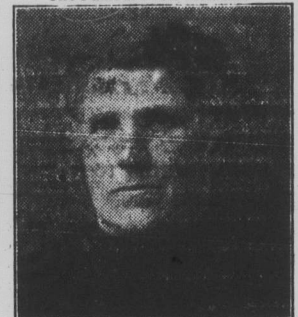
Amount Collected Now Exceeds
