Col. James French Goes Around Thanking God for His Defeat. The Taxpayers Evidently Do Not Want Any More of It. The Waterworks Will Have to Remain as They Are.

What the property-holders had to decide was for or against \$400,000 to be granted for two new 10-million gallon pumping engines, additional mains and connections.

This was the most important vote and the bylaw was overwhelmingly defeated, 1388 votes to 565, an adverse majority of 823.

There was also a general improvement bylaw. This was to provide \$4,000 to be used for the purchase of the new drilled shaft, 10,785 to open St. George's street in accordance with the University agreement, and \$20,000 for improvements at the jail.

Improvements at St. Lawrence and St. Andrew's markets were also included in the total, which was \$144,000.

This too, was overwhelmingly defeated, the vote being for the bylaw 447 against 1310, showing an adverse majority of 863.

The freeholders and leaseholders who voted, by their decided majority declared that they did not want any more taxes for improvement of any kind, including waterworks, and that the waterworks should not be accepted.

The bylaw was framed hard enough to bring about their longed-for result.

Mr. James French was around town, after the polls closed, thanking God for the result, and declaring that retribution was fast overtaking our "bungling and extravagant civil rulers, aldermen and all."

There was not a little interest manifested in the voting, but the last session of money-bylaws was submitted to the property-holders August 6. On that occasion 3500 votes were cast, 2000 in favor and 1500 against.
