Year's Births, Deaths and Marriages.
The Registrar-General has just issued his 1931 annual report concerning the births, deaths and marriages of England and Wales, and it furnishes as usual a most interesting and valuable record of the life of the country at the middle of last year at something over 39,000,000. The marriages registered were 218,305, corresponding to a rate of 14.7 persons married per 1000 living in 1931, a slight increase on the 13.6 per 1000 since 1928—when it was 13.0. There is a tendency for church marriages to be fewer and for those at civil ceremonies to increase. Of previously divorced persons there are 150 who re-entered the marriage state, and 100 who were re-married. In the first 50 married partners, 14 widows and 3 divorced women were re-married. In the last 50 married partners, 11 widows and 2 divorced men were re-married.
