THEY SHOULD HAVE NO VOTES CIVIO EMPLOYED AND THE MUNI

CIPAL ELECTORS. The Ratepayers' Association Think Fire men, Policemen and School Teachers Should Not Be Allowed to Vote For Aldermen - Single Tax Men Cannos Join the Association-The City Soli

The Toronto Ratepayers' Association held a meeting in St. George's Hail last evening. Dr. Barwick, president, in the chair.

The following gentlemen were elected members: Messrs. J. R. Lee, J. W. Porch, George L. Hillman, John T. Moore, K. Cerbery, J. R. Bond and Mr. Embery. Mr. J. R. Prittie introduced a motion conemning the covenant clause in mortgages, but the chairman ruled it out of order as not being within the province of the association

to discuss according to the constitution. Mr. W. H. Hall moved, seconded by Mr. Bugg, that every salaried and permanent employe of the city whose name is placed on the municipal voters' list be identified with the letter "E" opposite their names and that the municipal franchise of each employe, including firemen, policemen, pub-lic and High school teachers and all other officials so far as such franchise relates to the election of aldermen and school trus-tees be in abeyance, and shall not be exercised by such employes, and that necessary legislation be obtained to bring into effect the suspension of such franchise, at the next

itting of the Legislature. Wanted the Teachers Excluded.

Mr. Crane objected to the passing of this motion, and said that many of the teachers did not take any interest in municipal elections. Many of the lady teachers have votes, and it is only a short time since they were granted this privilege, and it is not likely, he said, the Legislature will take it away so soon after being granted.

Mr. Hall replied that if teachers did not now take any interest in municipal matters the passing of such a law would not affect them. This motion, he further stated, deals with all officials, not a class. A man who is drawing a salary from the city has a direct interest in getting a man elected who will support him.

Mr. Adair said that if Mr. Hall was the city solicitor he would "whistle a different tune." Mr. Adair would support the motion if the teachers were struck out.

Mr. Frittie made a vigorous speech in opposition to the motion. The matter should be carefully looked into. It is a retrogade step. It takes away the freedom from man, and he could not support it, and moved that it be referred to a committee, but his motion was lost.
