attack by the Kurdish raiders.

A letter received in Constantinople from Erzeroum, under the date of Nov. 5, supplies abundant proof that e massacres there were begun and ded by Turkish soldiers acting under orders, rather than by the populace, who followed the lead of the soldiers throughout. The soldiers and their civilian allies plundered 1000 dwellings and 2000 shops and killed 1000 men, women and children. The Government, the letter save is now endervoing to the letter says, is now endeavoring to restore to the people such of their pro-perty as may be available and to dis tribute some bread among the starving inhabitants, doubtless under instructions from Constantinople.
