**CRIME DECREASE IN STRATFORD**

**Farmers Making Applications For Old Country Laborers**

**REV. LEICHLITER SPEAKS**

**Historical Society Will Gather Military History of Perth**

**STRAFORD, Jan. 31.** — An encouraging decrease in crime in the city is noted in the annual report of Chief of Police J. L. Broadley, submitted at the inaugural meeting of the board of police commissioners to-day. During the past year 481 persons were arrested or summoned, a decrease of 154 over 1921.

Street accidents, who contributed \$500, totaled \$5 as contrasted with \$4 the previous year. Only one automobile was stolen compared with nine in 1921. Revenue aggregating \$3,410 was collected in the granting of city licenses, the largest slice coming from billiard-throwers, who contributed \$500.

Commenting upon the larger number of street accidents during the year, Chief Broadley stated that he was hopeful that when the winter became more acquainted with the traffic regulations the number would be reduced. The newly appointed board of police commissioners, who will be relieved in March to some extent, it is stated, when some 2,000 farm laborers will be brought to Ontario from the mother country. Most of these are experienced farm laborers.

Miss Campbell, one of the provincial health nurses, who was born in Perth last year, is in the city looking over conditions. She expressed herself as pleased with the health of the work, had made here and reports that in nearly every place that she has revisited the work is flourishing.

**TURK PLAYING OLD GAME**

**Trying To Divide Europe By Dealing With Allies Separately.**

**NEW YORK, Feb. 1.** — By Canadian Press. — The Tribune in an editorial on the differences between Great Britain and France over the treaty presented to the Turks at Lausanne, says: "Back of this difference of opinion lies the important point that France has no clearly defined Turkish policy and that Great Britain has a policy which has developed through her recent controversies over Greece and the determined stand which she took against the Kemalists' advance at Chanak."

The Tribune declares the real test of the relations between the two nations will come if the French keep their delegation at Lausanne next week after the other delegations have left. "The Turk is playing his old game of dividing Europe and the present difference between France and Great Britain will be especially pleasing to Ankara."
