SENSATIONAL HOLD-UP AT TORONTO

Robber Gang Gets off with \$82,000 Cash and Shoot Three Bank Messengers.

Within the shadow of several banking institutions, in the heart of the financial district, the most daring hold-up known in the criminal annals of Toronto was staged about 9.45 Tuesday morning at Jordan and Melinda streets.

During the affray three bank messengers—Walter S. Duck, 30 Gough Avenue, Union Bank; J. W. Harris, 4 Luttrell Avenue, Standard Bank, and David Campbell, 280 Lippincott Street, Sterling Bank, were severely wounded, and it is feared one or more may succumb to wounds from the sawed-off shotguns used by the thugs.

Petrolia, July 22.—The Corn, Grain and Seed Growers' Association of Lambton county purpose to build up a source of supply of choice farm seeds.

A communication was read from Principal Mahon regarding the termination of his services as public school principal as advised by the Board.

A discussion on these communications ensued in which Mr. Fitzgerald, Mr. Mahon, Mr. McKercher, T. B. Taylor, S. Stapleford, Dr. McGillicuddy and the Chairman took part.

Moved in amendment by Howden—McKercher, that we accept the application of Mr. Doolittle as our Public School Principal at a salary of fifteen hundred dollars per annum. Amendment carried by Yeas and Nays as follows:

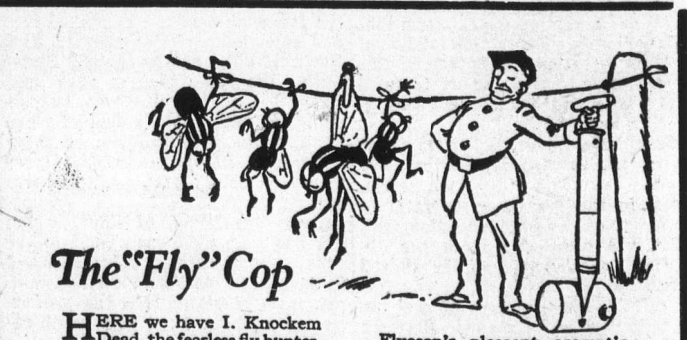
