Bovine Tuberculosis.

Bovine tuberculosis was introduced into New Hampshire three or four years ago by the importation of diseased cows from Massachusetts, and the Legislature enacted a law for the suppression of it. A report recently submitted by the New Hampshire Cattle Commissioners shows that during the past year no less than 115 tuberculous cows were found and killed, at a cost to the State of \$1,828.

An estimate of the value of the cows, and of the damage done by them, if they were not diseased is made, and the State pays half of it to the owner. In every instance a post-mortem examination verified the diagnosis of the tuberculous.

While Prof. Koch's tuberculin may not be serviceable in curing or checking the progress of tuberculosis in the human subject, it is an agent of great value to the farmer, because of the ease with which it reveals the presence of the disease in cattle. Even most expert veterinarians can detect tuberculin in no other way than the value of the milk, and the early stages of it. The New Hampshire Cattle Commissioners say: "We have killed a number of cows which reacted to tuberculin, and when animals do not react after injection it can be said, with almost absolute certainty, that they are free from tuberculosis. The Household.

Prevention of Disease. The human body contains within itself a power of resistance capable of doing battle successfully with disease germs, and when the bodily condition is normally active, the chances are all in favor of the human organism. In childhood, however, when the process of nutrition and development are in a state of susceptibility, the system is especially sensitive to infection and a derangement of all the organs is especially likely to occur.

One of the most important things to be borne in mind by those who have children is the necessity of maintaining a healthful condition of nutrition. This constitutes nature's own means of preventing disease. It includes attention to the quality and quantity of food, proper attention to light and air, and the avoidance of all unsanitary influences of every character. Habits of outdoor exercise should be formed at an early age.

Isolation from the community at large of persons suffering from disease is one of the methods most universally employed, and it is also one of the most useful. In private households this is usually done by setting apart the sick in that part of the dwelling which admits of the least communication with the other parts, while every means for the conveyance of the infectious materials from the sick-room is carefully guarded against.

Disinfection, if properly carried out, is an extremely useful means of preventing the spread of contagious disease. Fumigation by sulphur is entirely inefficient. The walls, ceilings, floors, furniture of the room treated must be subjected to the actual contact of the carbolic solution or to whatever antiseptic disinfectant agent may be employed.

The Cellar. One of the most neglected, and therefore dangerous departments of the household, is the cellar. This is quite liable to be more or less damp, and consequently to grow mildew and mold, even if free from the infection of decaying vegetables, as is not always the case. Besides, in not a few instances, a thorough investigation would disclose the presence of rough old boards, laden with germs of disease. Clear them all out; use fresh, smooth and shovels; get the whole area as clean as possible, and then use a good antiseptic. Then ventilate thoroughly, apply whitewash freely and ventilate again. Then go into the cellar and compare the apartment with what it was before the work of air and odor. Having done this, do not wait for the annual cleaning, but keep it clean, day by day and month by month, paying especial attention to ventilation. The air in the cellar, however vitiated it may be, inevitably finds its way to the living rooms above, and into the lungs of the occupants, with all its load of infection and danger.
