The total number of Medical Examinations passed upon, by the Medical Board for the year ending 1st December, 1895, was 23,956, of whom 25,951 were passed, and 3,005 were rejected.

The cost of admission to the Order in most Courts is only \$7 to \$11, according to the amount of Ben.
