One night-she sleeps in my room-I heard a tiny roice say, 'teacher!' it mingled with my dreams, and I did not answer. Again it came, as soft as before, and again [ was not sufficiently awake to know anything definitely; but the third time I realized that 0 Mitsu Chan (we say Chan instead of San for little tots) was calling me. I asked what is it? I had feared she was sick, but she answered, as bright as a new dollar, "I am awake.' 'Oh, indeed,' said I ; but being rather elecpy I did not wish to prolong the conversation, and asked her if she wanted anything, and receiving a negative answer, turned over to go to sleep again. A little while after I heard a little disturbance, and asked hor what was the matter. She says again, brightly, 'Oh, I am up.' I told her it was too early to get up, to get back to bed again and try to sleep till duylight. Without a woid she tumbled back and was soon breatising softly and regularly. Sho has so many cute wars she twines herself round our hearts. For all she is so little, she reads her Bible with the others at prayers and tries to learn as many verses as any of them.
