Teachers should draw the attention of their pupils to the opening of the colleges next month. There may be scholars who are looking forward in the future to a college course. Encourage them to lay a good foundation in their studies so that they may be well prepared for this or for any work in life that lies open before them. Their interest will be aroused in their present work if they have an object in view.

The meeting of the Provincial Educational Association of Nova Scotia will be held at Truro on the last day of August and the first two days

of September. A programme of particulars will be found on another page. The subjects to be discussed are important and will no doubt draw together a large representation of teachers.

The Royal Commission on Industrial Training and Technical Education, of which Dr. J. W. Robertson is chairman, is now making a tour of the Maritime Provinces collecting evidences and making inquiries in regard to industries and other operations. The Commission will visit other portions of Canada with the same object in view after which it will make an inquiry into systems and methods of technical instruction in the United States, Great Britain, Germany, France and other countries. It is confidently expected that the results from the labours of such a commission will be of the greatest advantage to Canada in developing its resources and in advancing technical pursuits.
