# FOETAL ALCOHOL SYNDROME

**Mr. Ross Belsher (Fraser Valley East):** Madam Speaker, foetal alcohol syndrome, known as FAS, is a disease with far-reaching repercussions. It is caused before birth when a pregnant mother consumes alcohol.

While we do not know a great deal about FAS, we do know that children born with FAS exhibit varying symptoms of mental retardation. Some children are visibly handicapped, while others learn of their disabilities later in life. The trauma for the child in the family is great. It is often worse for adoptive parents who have no clue to the cause of their child's problem.

Witnesses appearing before the House committee on health issues told us there was no cure for the neurological damage of foetal alcohol syndrome. Although the tragedy is great there is hope. foetal alcohol syndrome can be prevented: Alcohol consumption should be avoided during pregnancy.

I encourage the Minister of National Health and Welfare to undertake with his provincial counterparts a campaign to inform expectant mothers about foetal alcohol syndrome. Let us avoid further tragedy.
