marched in a fingle file) till you get over fuch ground, and then refume your former order, and march till it is quite dark before you encamp, which do, if poffible, on a piece of ground that may afford your centries the advantage of feeing or hearing the enemy at fome confiderable diftance, keeping one half of your whole party awake alternately through the night.

IV. Some time before you come to the place you would reconnoitre, make a ftand, and fend one or two men, in whom you can confide, to look out the beft ground for making your obfervations.

V. If you have the good fortune to take any prifoners, keep them feparate, till they are examined, and in your return take a different rout from that in which you went out, that you may the better difcover any party in your rear, and have an opportunity, if their ftrength be fuperior to yours, to alter your courfe, or difperfe, as circumftances may require.

VI. If you march in a large body of three or four hundred, with a defign to attack the enemy,
