

CHAMPION WELSH BOXES FOR SOLDIERS' BENEFIT

PACKED HOUSE ATTENDS THE PRO BOXING BOUTS

Champion Welsh Displays His Skill Against Three Men—The Preliminary Card.

The Sportsmen's Patriotic Association scored its greatest success last night at the Freddie Welsh show in Loew's. The roof garden was packed, the attendance being 2,000, which would realize about \$4000 for the fund. The show was a success, and the Welsh, who was to have boxed Welsh, was stalled in the New York State snowstorm, and Tom Macdonald of Montreal took his place, and won every opportunity to display his skill, that has taken him to the top of the fight ladder. Willard Gets Big Money To Fight an Easy Mark
CHICAGO, Dec. 15.—Articles of agreement binding Jess Willard, the world's heavyweight champion pugilist, to a match March 4 at New Orleans with Fulton, of Rochester, Minn., for the world's championship, were signed here today.

Willard is to receive \$25,000, win, lose or draw, and Fulton is to get \$10,000, a provision that in lieu of the lump sum, he is to receive 10 per cent. of the moving picture rights. The agreement makes the fight a 20-round championship contest, to be fought at the New West Side Athletic Club of New Orleans.

The agreement was signed by Tom Jones, for Jess Willard, and by Fulton, for Fulton, and Thomas S. Andrews, of New Orleans, for the New Orleans Athletic Club. The referee will be chosen later.
