which suspended there yesterday, interviewed here to-night, declined to discuss the failure one way or the othr. He said: "I will not consent to an interview. for you can readily understand that my talking at this time would do me a positive injury. Of course, there'll be litigation to follow, and I can't afford to talk."

Tevis is a lawyer by profession, and is always engaged in promoting some financial project. Of his numerous ventures, it is stated, few have been notably successful. He spends little time in Louisville. Asked to-night if he would be liable under the Bank Act double liability clause for the protection of the bank's creditors, he said: "We'l, maybe and maybe not. A debt's a debt, you know, but you need not quote me on that."

Tevis was mixed up in the People's Insurance Co. affair at Syracuse, N.Y., some time ago. It is hinted here that he has used the Canadian bank to finance some of his ventures. A Mr. Chapman, son of E. R. Chapman of New York, is said to be with him in the deals.

Tevis is included in the bank's list of shareholders as possessing 1120 shares fully paid up to the extent of \$112,000, being the largest shareholder.
