Unprejudiced observers see better prices in the pools three ways against the favorites and outsiders, and all the horses are trying. There is no premium in this way of betting for a played horse to run outside the money. Whatever coin is lost on him in the mutuals goes to those who hold winning tickets, and only five per cent. to the machines.

C. method, and even the enormous, there is no galsaying that the books handled double or triple the sum, and generally retained the long end of the above-mentioned society to the contrary, notwithstanding.

And, above all, there is method and order in the shed, instead of the confusion and chaos. No need to hurry up and bet—the returns are the same on the first ticket as the last. Plus, the unsatisfactory gambling element is entirely eliminated.

Kid McCoy Looks Like a "Come-Back"

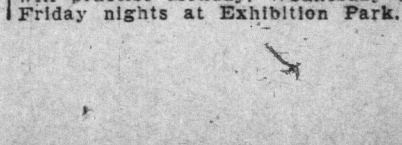
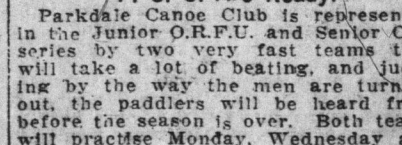
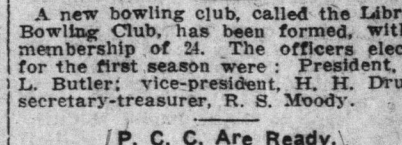
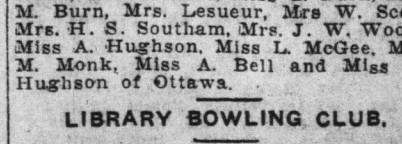
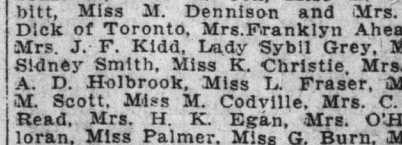
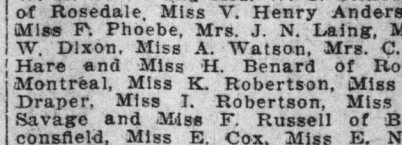
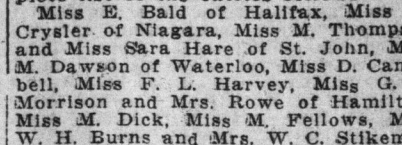
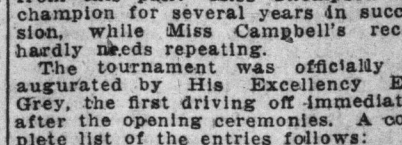
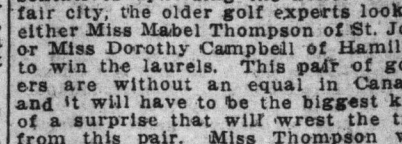
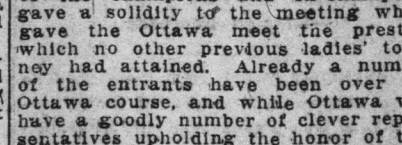
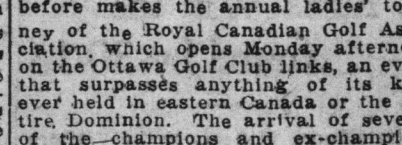
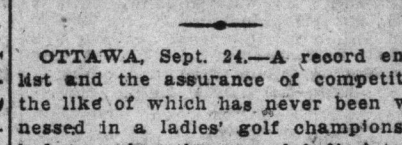
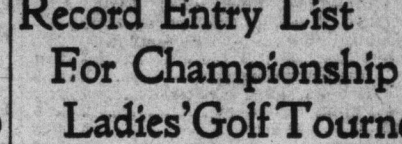
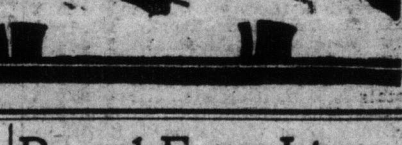
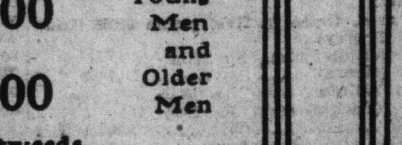
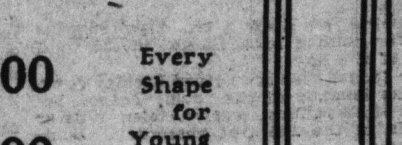
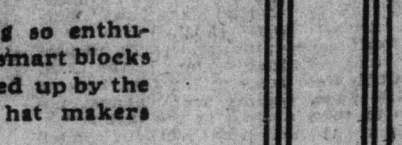
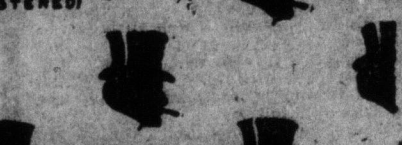
