Continued from Page 1. The rate would not be increased on the 10-year plan adopted. Mr. Eldridge said it became necessary to assess the policyholders at the end of eight years. The estimate of rates to agents on the five-year commitment option plan, which was subsequently adopted, was also insufficient. In both cases extra assessments were made necessary because the mortality was greater than anticipated. The agents were notified that the estimate was insufficient. He did not believe the company would have the surplus estimated when the ten years had elapsed.

**County Councilors Annoyed**  
 Mr. Hughes then asked the witness about the Canadian law of 1904. This law provided for a transfer of the Canadian policyholders of the Reserve Life Insurance Company from the assessment plan to a fixed premium plan. Asked if it is true that the United States are compelled, when 65 years old, to pay the rate of the Canadian policyholder under the company's 19-year plan at the same age, Mr. Eldridge compared the policies issued to Canadians under the new law to the policy held by the company which had committed to Gov. Folk of Missouri that the Mutual Reserve had \$125 after having paid premiums to the company for a long term of years.

The body was conveyed to the central station on a second field battery gun carriage, and placed on the afternoon train for conveyance to Montreal.

**BACKSTREET'S BUSY DAY**  
**STREETS WERE 'WORST EVER'**

Thousands of Toronto's citizens were wakened from a sound slumber at an unseasonable hour yesterday morning by the clang of the fire bell but by the tinkle of the blacksmith's hammer as he pried his trade. For the time being union hours and regulations were cast to the winds, with the result that a few of the sons of Vulcan have gone far toward acquiring a competence. The light snowfall of Sunday followed by the mid-day squall of Saturday morning, had left the streets in a condition which rendered occupation by horse and foot alike a disagreeable task. In the majority of the blacksmiths' shops the doors were thrown open on the day of Sunday morning, and were even then filled with horses. Considering the fact that such dirty, dusty, and noisy work is regarded as a remarkable that no serious accident occurred.

**LOOK OUT FOR BARGAIN COUNTERS**  
 American Manufacturers Will Be Flooding Canada Some Day.  
 Montreal, Dec. 4.—(Special)—As fore-shadowed, Lord Strathcona ceased at noon to be president of the Bank of Montreal. E. L. Clouston was made a director and will now be vice-president and general manager, while Sir George A. Drummond, who has been vice-president 18 years, and directed the bank for over 40 years, has stepped down to the rank of director. In an address, the general manager said: "I may say that the one word written large in the records of Canada this year is 'Prosperity.' Probably never before have we had a twelve month period where we have collected so much business, so many resources and strengthened themselves in every way. The banks are now in a position to meet the needs of the country, and when American bargain counters will be opened in many cases the banks will be able to meet them." The directors of the Hamilton Art School this afternoon agreed to accept the Dominion government's guarantee similar to that given to farmers should be given to mechanics and artists, and in return grants should be given for technical education. A request was also sent to the Ontario government for a law permitting cities with a population of 50,000 to appropriate \$5000 for this purpose.

**STUDENTS ARE FEW.**  
 Slight Overdraft in Semi-Annual Report of College of Pharmacy.  
 The first session of the council of the Ontario College of Pharmacy, under the regulations of the new act, was held yesterday at the college. The half-yearly statement showed a bank overdraft of \$304.65 to meet current expenses. To offset this there was a surplus balance of \$274. The total receipts are \$126,067.46; disbursements, \$125,792.81. The surplus balance of \$274.65 is explained by the slight number of pupils in the college. Only 96 are enrolled, a decrease of 145, as in previous years. The shortage is caused by the raising of the qualifications of students.
