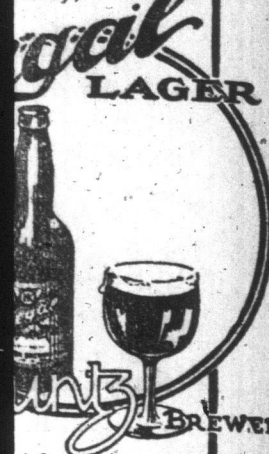

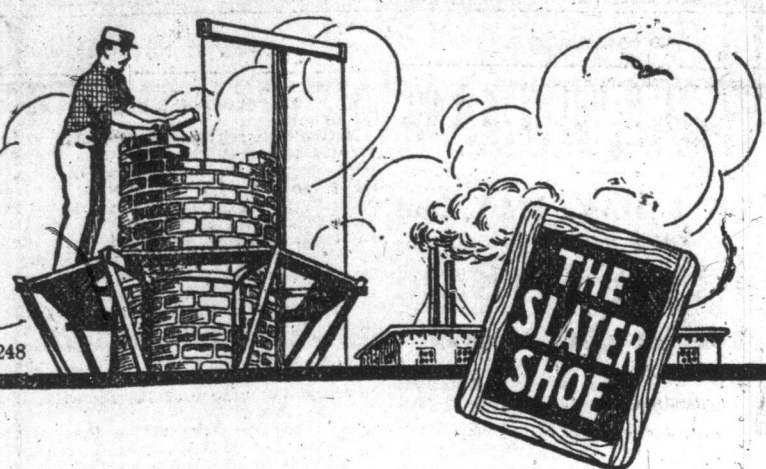

WOULD LIMIT PRIVILEGES OF PROVINCIAL CHARTER

C.P.R. Take Ground in Case of
Their Own Which May Affect
All the Province.

Provincial rights in regard to the in-
corporation of companies will be the
subject of a legal battle before the su-
preme court at Ottawa on May 7. C. H.
Ritchie, K. C., and Thomas Mulvey,
K. C., assistant provincial secretary,
will represent Ontario. The case will
probably go to the privy council.

The question is, whether companies in-
corporated by the Province of On-
tario can do business outside of the
Province of Ontario. The rights of

thousands of companies all over the
province are involved, representing cap-
ital up to nearly a billion dollars. In-
volved is also a matter of \$150,000 or
more revenue each year to the province.
It also affects every other province in
Canada.

The point comes up in the case of
P. R. v. Ottawa Fire Insurance Co.
The C.P.R. desired insurance in the
Ottawa Company, against fires that
might be caused by sparks from en-
gines passing along its line. The

was a loss, and litigation followed. The
C. P. R. then argued that if the com-
pany were not bound by the policy they
should repay the premiums. They
sued, but were beaten.

Now, before the supreme court, the
C.P.R. raises a new question, viz., the
right of a company with a provincial
charter to do business outside of On-
tario. Accordingly, the supreme court
has notified every provincial attorney
general to be represented. The B.N.A.
act authorizes provinces to incorporate
companies with provincial charters. This
the C.P.R. argues, means that they can-
not do business outside the province.

If this view is upheld, practically all
companies will have to go to Ottawa
for a Dominion charter.

WILL NOT PROSECUTE.
Lord's Day Alliance Up in Arms
Against Decision.

VICTORIA, B. C., April 26.—The pro-
vincial government, at the close of the
session, announced its attitude on the
Dominion Lord's Day Act, declining to
assent to any prosecutions under the
act.

The Lord's Day Alliance is already up
in arms, declaring the Dominion had
no power to leave it optional with the
provinces to enforce the law.

The government's reply is to go to
Ottawa and fight that out in Ottawa.

HOPE FOR READJUSTMENT OF THE MODUS VIVENDI

Conference of Premier Bond and
Lord Elgin May Lead to an
Arrangement.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., April 26.—The
colonial government officials here say
that Sir Robert Bond's conference in
London Wednesday with Lord Elgin
regarding the American fisheries ques-
tion was only the first of a series of
discussions, which it is hoped will re-
sult in the adjustment of the entire
matter.

Premier Bond is in telegraphic com-
munication with the ministers, who will
consider whatever proposals are made
to him, and suggest such amendments
as seem desirable.

The officials here expect that the ne-
gotiations will be protracted, and that
a solution of the question will be dif-
ficult on account of the firm stand taken
by Newfoundland and the contrary
attitude of the British cabinet towards
the United States.

CLAIM AND COUNTER CLAIM.

Suits in Which the Dominion Chair
Company Are Involved.

The dispute over the Dominion Chair
Company's management, being heard
before Chief Justice Falconbridge in the
non-jury assizes, in which T. N. Clark,
late manager of the company, is bring-
ing suit against the company for \$23,000
for moneys due him as per agreement
made by the president, Dr. Beattie
Nesbitt, was not concluded yesterday.

Dr. Beattie Nesbitt was the chief wit-
ness. He told of sundry trips made by
T. N. Clark, which were charged to ex-
penses, but which were not on business
for the company.

Witness said that all the time Clark
was manager there were financial dif-
ficulties. Already \$70,000 had been
spent on the plant at Gravenhurst, and
at present the concern was indebted to
the bank for \$23,000.

George H. Watson, K. C., is appear-
ing for Clark.

Against Clark's claim on Dr. Nesbitt
for \$23,000, the latter counter-claims
for \$20,841. Clark was too fond of au-
tomobiles instead of paying attention
to business is the argument put up by
the registrar. When the concern was
under other management, the doctor
said that he learned that Clark got
more money than he was entitled to.

Dr. Nesbitt is the owner of the Hub-
bard Dental Company, said the witness,
holding about \$50,000 in stock. The
company was incorporated with Claude
Macdonell, W. Boland, Mrs. Nesbitt and
himself as shareholders. Messrs. Mac-
donell and Boland had only one share
each.

Clark Manufacturing Company, with a
