DID MONTREALERS UP.

Fair Had Scheme to Make Illicit Whiskey.

MONTREAL, July 6.—One of the slickest confidence men Montreal has ever had to deal with has just disappeared after cleaning up about \$15,000.

His scheme was the illicit manufacture of liquor, and almost every man he tackled said "Fine," and he, thinking that there was a mint of money in it, but the old story—they were disappointed. There is not much danger of the fakir being prosecuted, because the ones whose money he got are so badly mixed up in the conspiracy to make illicit liquor that they are afraid to act.

His proposal to each individual, supposed to be absolutely confidential, and only made to that person, was to become partners with him in making the illicit stuff.

He had all the plans arranged, he claimed, to make a thousand gallons a week. The manufacture of whiskey was to be carried on under the cloak of a Canadian wine factory. The whiskey was to be made from sour wine, which, experts say, furnishes a whiskey of sixty overproof.

In letting his accomplices have a look at the machine that was to turn out their thousand gallons of whiskey a week, which was to be sold for three thousand dollars, he told them that he would have a small, inexpensive still on the premises for the revenue men to find in case they should be warned in some way or other of what was going on.

He had a subterranean chamber and passage dug in an old warehouse at the rear of the Dominion Button Works on Visitation-street, and there the thousand gallon still, which cost eleven hundred dollars, and the men saw it was a beauty, was installed.

That night, while the arch-schemer was buying champagne for some of his victims, the still was quietly taken apart and shipped away to no one knows where.

Later the gentleman himself also went away.

ORGANIZATIONS ASKED TO HELP TORONTO GROW

Those Who Will Be Officially Invited to Express Opinions on Program.

A copy of the resolution of Ald. Church re the Greater Toronto, adopted by the city council, and the following suggestions of Ald. Church, handed in to the special committee, was ordered yesterday to be sent by Controller Harrison, the chairman of the special committee, to the following organizations and persons, who are asked to forward their opinions of the same within a week, together with any views or resolutions of their own.

The list includes: The Trades and Labor Council, the board of trade, the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, the Guild of Civic Art, Retail Merchants' Association, Riverdale Business Men's Association, harbor commissioners, Toronto Improvement Association, Employers' Association, various ratepayers' associations, Industrial Exhibition Association, board of education, public library board, and the following municipalities: R. & O. Hamilton Steamboat Co., Turbina Steamship Co., Montreal & Lake Erie Navigation Co., Toronto Ferry Co., Canadian Ship Building Co., Polson Iron Works, C. I. T. Co., and J. T. Matthews and Harbor Master Postlewaite.

The following additions to the list of suggestions to be considered have been made:

That the new Union Station be a terminal, not a way station.

That debentures be let for a well-organized and systematic plan for the regulation and control of all signs and sign boards in the city.

That there be further municipal regulation of the plans on which all streets and lands are laid out, to the width of street.

That a "Greater Toronto Bill" be prepared for the legislature.

PICKET FINED FOR ASSAULT.

Slapped the Face of Employee of the Scale Works.

During some labor trouble at the Wilson Scale Works, Louis Boese and John Allen were posted as pickets to keep tab on actions of employees. John Allen went down to work there, was accosted, and had an argument with the pickets. Boese slapped him. In the afternoon police court he pleaded guilty to a charge of assault, and was fined \$1 and costs. Allen was allowed to go.

DROWN IN ESCAPING FLAMES

Three Men Victims of Forest Fire in Quebec Province.

QUEBEC, July 5.—A fierce forest fire is raging near Reed Station, 60 miles from here, and has caused the death of three men.

They were trying to escape from the fire and rushed into a lake and were drowned. Only one of the victims has been identified. He is an Englishman named W. T. Macdonald.

GIVEN UP THE GHOST.

Defence in Crockett Case Says the Crown Has Quit.

FREDERICTON, N.B., July 5.—Premier Robinson, acting attorney-general, when asked to-day what action the crown would take in the Emmerson case, at first said nothing and then said:

British Journalists Coming to Canada.

A party of British journalists will leave England on the 28th of July, sailing from Liverpool on July 19 for a tour through Canada. The party will be composed of ten representatives of Newcastle, Glasgow, Dundee and Belfast. These journalists will be the guests of the Canadian government, and on arrival at Montreal will be met by the Grand Trunk Railway System and the Canadian Pacific Railway System.

New Minister Without Portfolio.

FREDERICTON, July 5.—James Barnes, M.L.A. for Kent, was sworn in to-day as minister without portfolio, in place of the late Mr. Borden.

An Honorary Degree.

CAMBRIDGE, Eng., July 5.—The honorary degree of doctor of laws was to-day conferred on Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, president of the League of Nations, by the University of New York, by Cambridge.

NO CAUSE TO COMPLAIN.

Those Immigrants Were Not So Badly Treated After All.

W. W. Carter of Fesserton, Ont., called on The World yesterday morning and gave a different explanation of the treatment of nine families sent from Toronto to Fesserton on July 1 from that contained in a letter which appeared in The World of July 4 and was signed by E. A. Wryghite, George Lee, mayor of Toronto, and about 5 o'clock, the train being late. The agent in Toronto had sent a telegram to Mr. Carter, but the telegram did not reach him, because the telegraph offices within striking distance of Fesserton were closed on July 1, hence no one was at the station to meet these nine families, because no word had come to Mr. Carter or his foreman regarding their arrival. In spite of this, however, the foreman of Mr. Carter's mill, soon after the arrival of the train, met all the workmen and did everything in his power to make them comfortable for the night. The board house was full, and so others were hunted up and the immigrants given blankets and made comfortable. Next morning they were taken care of by Mr. Carter, who saw that they were supplied with food, and other houses were hunted up and every effort made to accommodate them.

MEAT DEALERS TO GATHER.

OTTAWA, July 5.—Meat packing houses and transportation companies interested in the export and interprovincial meat trade are being notified to send representatives to a meeting which is to be held on July 17 at Ottawa in the office of the deputy minister of agriculture.
