Port Colborne Harbor.

Mr. McCleary moved the following resolution: "That, inasmuch as there has been expended by the Federal Government of Canada on the canals of the Dominion, up to the 30th June, 1898, \$73,772,622, and of this amount there has been expended for construction and enlargement of the Welland Canal \$22,806,459, it is the opinion of this House that, having regard to this large expenditure, which constitutes a heavy charge on the revenues of the country, if the harbor of Port Colborne, on Lake Erie, at the southern end of the Welland Canal, and the harbor of Port Dalhousle, on Lake Ontario, at the northern end of same canal, were improved, and sufficient elevator facilities provided, so that large lake carriers could enter, it would not only give the most rapid and the cheapest route for the products of the great West to tide water in the East but as well utilize the waterway already provided at the large cost to the country above stated."

In support of his resolution, he spoke at considerable length on the necessity for utilizing the St. Lawrence route in preference to searching for new routes.
