CHANGES CAUSED NO STIP Transfer of Premiership Has Hardly Made a Ripple on the Political Surface

GUESSWORK AS TO SELECTION Balfour's Followers Name Him for Chancellor of Exchequer, But He Has Duties Enough.

New York, July 20.—Cabling from London The Tribune's correspondent says: So stagnant is the condition of political and social life after the poignant disappointment of the first coronation week that the retirement of Lord Salisbury has hardly made a ripple on the surface. The change of Prime Ministers has been effected as easily as a transfer of court officials from one post to another, and has apparently been unaccompanied by the exercise of royal authority and discretion. Although followed by the announcement of the impending retirement of the Chancellor of the Exchequer, this change in the direction of the destinies of the empire has not caused the smallest flurry in the Stock Exchange nor affected the prices of commodities in the slightest degree. Thoughtful anglers are impressed with the conservatism and stability of their political institutions, and are enabled to find some compensations for the lack of excitement and progress in an enterprise with which the nation is reproached.

Picking Out Portfolios. His followers are urging him to become Chancellor of the Exchequer in imitation of Mr. Gladstone's practice, and in this way protect himself against the expansion of Mr. Chamberlain's influence in the cabinet. The fact that Mr. Chamberlain has two offices would not interfere with the amalgamation of two great financial posts, the one being the office of the Chancellor of the Exchequer, and the other being the office of the Secretary of the Treasury. Mr. Balfour is not a financier, nor is he fond of official drudgery. The Treasury is an office of honor and not of profit, and the Commons will give him all the work he wants, and there is little in the argument that his authority will not be challenged if, as Chancellor of the Exchequer, he is in a position to settle directly with the heads of the spending departments. Mr. Chamberlain's enemies will not believe it, but he is content to remain where he is, and allow Mr. Balfour to carry on the government on frankly Imperialistic lines, with a federation of the colonies and the United Kingdom as the goal to be approached gradually but surely.

For the Treasury. Lord George Hamilton, on the strength of the reputation of having worked out cleverly the difficult problems of Indian finance, is regarded by members of the House as the most probable candidate for the succession to the treasury, and Lord Hanbury also has support as a likely man of affairs in politics, but these are merely work in progress, and can easily be supplanted by other names. Inasmuch as Lord James Herford, Lord Ashborne and Lord Halsbury, following the example of Lord Salisbury, are expected to retire after the coronation, there will be a general shuffling up of the benches in the cabinet. Messrs. Austen, Chamberlain and George Wyndham will be members of the new cabinet, unless Mr. Hanbury is appointed. Mr. Hanbury will be Lord Chancellor if Lord Halsbury is not elected, and Mr. Hanbury can be induced to believe that any one except himself can select judges for the bench. The Duke of Marlborough is named for several places, such as Secretary of the Treasury or Australia, but he has been taking a marked interest in the fortunes of Winston Churchill, and may be content if his kinsman's claims to political promotion are recognized.

DEATHS IN 1902 FIVE Details of the Destructive Tornado That Swept Dundas County on Thursday.

LIFTED BARNS LIKE FEATHERS. Most Destructive Storm Known in Eastern Ontario—A Funnell-Shaped Cloud. Chesterville, Ont., July 19.—The cyclone of Thursday night proves to have been the most disastrous of the kind ever experienced in this community. It covered a wide area, and destroyed five lives. In addition, it people were killed and about half a million dollars' worth of property was swallowed up. In many respects, it was a spectacular affair, and the story of eye-witnesses indicates a most extraordinary atmospheric condition.

The Dead. MRS. JOHN Q. KEARNS, Chesterville, married woman, aged 33 years. EDWARD KEARNS, Chesterville, aged 7, son of the above. MISS MACGREGOR, Ormond, aged 35. MRS. NELSON HART Grantley, aged 28. WILLIAM BRECKSTEAD, Grantley. The Injured. JOHN W. KEARNS, Chesterville, fractured hip. NORAH KEARNS, aged 12, compound fracture right arm, fracture of nose and concussion of brain; recovery doubtful. MARGUERITE KEARNS, aged 4, fracture left arm, face and leg injured.

The most destructive storm center was Finch, Winchester and Osnabrock Townships. At Ormond, the storm first made its appearance, and swept from there to the St. Lawrence River. Four miles from the Village of Chesterville is situated the farm of John Kearns. This was the first place where the storm caused destruction. Mrs. Kearns was dashed to death, a 7-year-old boy was killed, and a 12-year-old daughter was badly hurt that she cannot survive, and John Kearns and another child received broken limbs. After undergoing a most heroic operation, the children were taken to the hospital, and the husband was in the field adjoining the farm, where he was struck by a tree and thrown into the air. The great timbers were twisted in a marvelous manner, and every vestige of the premises was destroyed.
