> The plaintiff's claim is: "On behalf of himself and all other ratepayers and electors of the city of London, for an injunction to restrain the defendant, as returning officer for and clerk of the Municipality of the City of London, from proceeding to declare the result of, or in any way acting upon, the poll at the election or the city of London, held on the 2nd day of January, 1899, on the ground that the said election is void by reason of the presence, contrary to section 173 of the municipal act, in each of the polling places, of two agents, for and against a certain bylaw, No. 1,101, which was unlawfully passed by the Council of the City of London, for the purpose of corruptly influencing voters contrary to section 245 of the municipal act, to secure the re-election of the mayor and certain of the aldermen, and the ap-pointment of certain electors to act as agents for and against the said bylaw, at each of the 40 polling subdivisions in the said city, with the promise of payment for their services out of the funds of the corporation."

# POISONING FIEND

Another Death From Cyanide of Mercury.

Henry C. Barnet Supposed to Have Been a Victim of the Person Who Killed Mrs. Adams.

New York, Jan. 3.-The Herald says: There is a strong likelihood that Henry C. Barnet, who died at the Knickerbocker Athletic Club on Nov. 10, ostensibly from diphtherla, according to the death certificate made out by his physician, was murdered by poison, as was Mrs. Adams, and that the same poison was used to take his life as was utilized in the case of the woman. Cyanide of mercury was administered in each case. The body of Barnet has been exhumed, and it is said that sufficient evidence has been obtained to prove that the body contains traces of

the poison named. There is said to be little doubt that the person who caused the death of Mrs. Adams, is also responsible for the death of Barnet, with this difference, that while he did not intend to kill Mrs. Adams, but Cornish, the death of Barnet was deliberately planned.

The English ask for full liberty to establish industrial and manufacturing concerns in the interior. They want to open and work mines on equal ly favorable terms with the natives. The petition asks that more attention be given to the French and Russian activity in Central and Western China.

G. T. R. VS. STATE OF NEW YORK. Albany, N. Y., Jan. 3.-The Grand large building used by Joseph Baul & Trunk Railway Company of Canada today filed with the state court of claims a claim against the state for \$31,529. The claim is based on the accommodation of the state in filling up a slip, which formed part of the Erie Canal in the city of Buffalo, and called Palmer feet and limbs.
