BISHOP OFFENDS FELLOW DIRECTORS HOLDS UP CAR TO ESCAPE CROWD

McCabe Requested to Resign from International Policyholders' Committee.

Man Who Tries to Snatch Diamond Rings from Girl Stops Motorman With Revolver.

New York, Sept. 7.—At the meeting of the international policyholders' committee at the Waldorf-Astoria today, at which Richard Olney presided, and at which the full membership was present, the letter recently written by Bishop McCabe to Alton B. Parker was discussed, and resolutions were adopted relieving the bishop from further service on the committee.

The proceedings were held behind closed doors, and after adjournment resolutions which had been adopted were made public. They set forth that Bishop McCabe accepted membership on the committee, but was unable to attend any of the meetings, or those of its sub-committees, although respectfully urged to do so; that there was furnished to the press from the officers of the Mutual Life Insurance Company on Aug. 21 a letter bearing the signature of Bishop McCabe, addressed to ex-Judge Parker as chairman of the executive committee, which had not been received by the committee at the time it was given for publication by the Mutual Life Insurance Company; that Bishop McCabe was communicated with by telegram, and letters, and urged to attend today's meeting to present his views to his associates, but made no reply, and that the views of the committee as to the course that should be pursued by the policyholders in the impending election for trustees as expressed in its address to the policyholders, issued July 9, are opposed to those expressed in the letter. The committee declares that it regards the attitude assumed in the letter as so completely out of sympathy with the announced purpose of the committee as to amount in effect to the surrender by Bishop McCabe of his membership in the committee. The committee decided also that it is not in the interests of the policyholders to accept his endorsement of the administration ticket of their company. It was stated that the company had agreed upon the directors for the New York Life, as well as those for the Mutual, but no names were to be made public until the tickets were filed with the superintendent of insurance on Sept. 18.

Township Councils.

LONDON.

London Township Council met in the town hall, Arva, on Sept. 3. Present: Hamilton Needham, reeve; S. F. Glass, James H. Hodgins, George E. Hudson and W. A. Langford, councillors. The following reports were made by councillors:

By George E. Hudson, re Mount St. Joseph boundary. No action taken, and the matter was referred back to him.

By S. F. Glass and W. A. Langford, re proposed sewer from the premises of the Dominion Office and Store Fitting Company, that it is probable that permission will be obtained from the Canadian Pacific Company to connect with their sewer.

By S. F. Glass, re damage by water to the premises of B. C. Brooks, lot 22, con. 1, that nothing doing this autumn.

The matter was referred back to him.

By W. A. Langford, that he and the county engineer had made a thorough examination of Vauxhall bridge, and that the engineer considers it would not be advisable to make any repairs this autumn as the season is already too far advanced.

Messrs. C. Stockwell, John Sutherland and Ven. Archdeacon addressed the council re a sidewalk from the end of the present walk on the Front Line road at Brougdale to St. Luke's Church. It was voted that the request of the deputation to bridge the mill race and build a sidewalk be granted, the cost to be paid out of the general fund of the township, and that the matter be left in the hands of Councillor Langford, with power. The clerk was also instructed to notify William Knapton, pathmaster, to have the fence erected across Brougdale street by James Henley removed immediately.

J. M. Hobbs addressed the council re the Front Line road. It was voted that in the event of the inspector of toll roads being called to inspect the Front Line road, in accordance with the petition of the ratepayers, that this council indemnify the ratepayers from any expenses charged by the inspector.

John Maxwell spoke of drain on lot 12, con. 12. Referred to the reeve with power.

Albert Needham spoke re drain on lot 12, con. 12. Referred to James H. Hodgins.

The question of a culvert opposite lot 22, con. 1, was referred to S. F. Glass.

The report of the board of health received from Engineer F. W. Farncomb, and will be read to the ratepayers at the next regular meeting of council, Oct. 1.

S. F. Glass gave notice that he will introduce a motion to good order at the special meeting of council to be held in the clerk's office, London, on Saturday, Sept. 8.

A communication from the Keenleyside Oil Company, re repairs to street leading to their premises, was referred to W. A. Langford, and a communication from Meredith, Judd & Meredith, re bridge on Adelaide street, was referred to S. F. Glass, seconded by James H. Hodgins, that in the matter of the Grand Trunk Railway crossing at Hyde Park, as per plans submitted to this council, that the Grand Trunk shall indemnify the township for all damages arising out of construction of said bridge to ratepayers, and that the solicitor be instructed to prosecute by agreement the township's interest in respect to this or any other construction work by said railway.

Whereas, the motion of Aug. 6, referring to the placing of a "Y" on Ashland avenue, instead of Ashland street, is not correct, inasmuch as the street referred to should be Eleanor street, instead of Ashland avenue, it was voted that the street railway company be permitted to place a "Y" at the intersection of Eleanor street with Governor's road, in accordance with previous motion, instead of at Ashland avenue.

An account from Thomas Talbot for \$10 for damages to his property while taking gravel from the roadway and filling in same, was passed. The assessor and surveyor were asked for. Ayes—George E. Hudson, W. A. Langford and Hamilton Needham. Nays—James H. Hodgins and S. F. Glass.

The following accounts were passed: Victoria Press, \$1.25; Advertiser Company, advertising tenders, \$3.00; Stanley Bros. spikes, \$1.60; F. W. Farncomb, fees, Bell award and survey, \$4.87; Mary Grant, \$1.00; Wm. H. Donley, lumber, drawing and work on bridge, \$11.72; T. J. Clatworthy, lumber for bridges, \$56.11; George H. Bekton, half cost lumber for culvert, \$4.18; Charles Skelett, repairing culvert and gravel, \$3.85; James Swarts, plank, drawing, etc., \$3.80; Climax Road Machine Company, road roller, \$28.00; G. A. Scott, pairing culvert, \$2.00; A. Cumming, inspecting Quiring bridge, \$3.50; D. Box, repairing bridge and spikes for the same, \$1.75.

Council adjourned until Sept. 8, when a special meeting will be held by order of the reeve for the purpose of opening tenders for two bridges crossing the Front Line road at Hale street, and dealing with the motion notice of which has been given by S. F. Glass, re good roads. Mary Grant, clerk.

New York, Sept. 7.—In frontier fashion, young man, armed with a big revolver, kept back a pursuing crowd of men, held up a street car, drove back those who attempted to corner him, and only surrendered when police reserves surrounded him in a saloon at One Hundred and Tenth street and Lexington avenue, last night. His capture was ascribed to the pluck of Miss Kate Becker, of No. 29 East One Hundred and Ninth street, whose father has a cigar store in No. 1604 Madison avenue, just around the corner from the home.

Miss Becker was in the store at 6 o'clock last night, when a young man entered and paid unusual attention to several diamond rings on her fingers. Half an hour later as she entered her home he stepped to her side. She tried to close the door and he made a grab at her rings. She caught him by the wrist, gave him a thrust in the stomach with her elbow, drove her heel into his instep and screamed for her dog, which set up a ferocious barking in a room on the second floor.

All this attracted a crowd outside and the intruder attempted to get away, but Miss Becker clung to his wrist, and led him back to the store. There her father told her that apparently the young man had made a mistake and she ought to accept his apology.

"But he's a thief!" shouted the girl. At that, the young man broke away, drew a revolver from his belt, and sprang through the crowd outside the door. Pursued by the crowd, he ran to Lexington avenue, sprang in front of a southbound car and leveled his revolver at the motorman, commanding him to stop the car and then run at full speed until he told him to stop. The motorman stopped the car, but jumped off the car, and was followed by most of the passengers. The man tried to start the car, but a track employee threw an iron bar across the track.

Policeman Arthur Mendelsohn ran up, to find himself looking into the muzzle of the revolver. "This is none of your funeral," shouted the young man, "and you beat it before you get hurt."

Mendelsohn took his revolver from his pocket and the crowd scattered, everyone expecting that a duel would be fought between the young man and the policeman. The young man sprang to run north in Lexington avenue. The crowd drew in around him and he flourished the revolver and shouted: "Open up there." Men and boys fell back, and he made a dash through an opening and into a saloon. Close behind him was Mendelsohn. The young man sprang into a corner behind lunch counter and leveled his revolver. For an instant the two stood facing each other with weapons raised.

"You drop that gun," shouted the policeman, "or I'll shoot."

Meantime reserves came rushing up, and as ten policemen pushed through the door the young man dropped his revolver.

"You've got me," he said, "but there's no side cop in this town that could take me and retain his health." He said that he was Charles Anderson, 28 years old, a billposter, living at No. 128 West Thirty-first street.

A HARMONY PLAN

Roosevelt Evolving One to Unite New York Republicans.

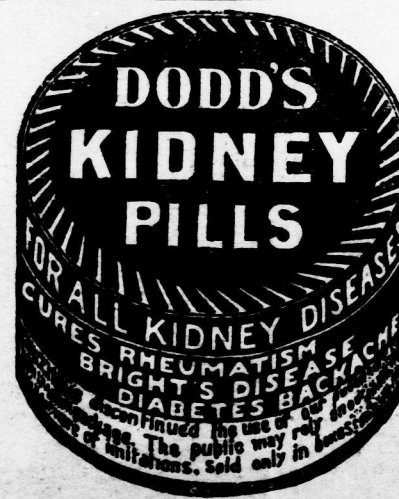
Oyster Bay, N. Y., Sept. 7.—There was a political conference at Sagamore Hill today. President Roosevelt had as his guests Representative Julius C. Littauer, Postmaster-General Cortelyou, chairman of the Republican national committee, and Lyman H. Bass, of Buffalo. It is understood that both the congressional campaign and the situation in New York State were thoroughly canvassed.

When Mr. Littauer returned from Sagamore Hill to take his train for New York, after spending several hours with the President, he emphasized again the fact that the President has a most keen interest in the outcome of the congressional election, and also that while he has determined to take no active part in the state situation he is very desirous that the right thing be done by the party in strengthening out its tangle.

While Mr. Littauer admitted that the state situation was discussed most seriously, he said he was not at liberty to announce any conclusion reached.

"It is apparent to every observing man in the state," he said, "that the situation today is such as to demand the advent of a man big enough to entirely ignore bossism, a man who could administer the affairs of the state as governor with a master hand and who could command the vote of the Republican party independent of factional opposition."

"New York has had ten years of Republican rule. The state has prospered under that rule and there is no doubt that a large percentage of young voters of the state are Republicans in their inclination. What the party needs at this moment is the nomination of a man for governor who can unite all the Republican votes of the state. Of course the work in hand is to find that man."
