"Industrial Democracy" was the subject of an address given by Dr. S. P. Reynolds to the Men's Brotherhood of Askin Street Methodist Church on Sunday morning. "Democracy, socialism and bolshevism." he said, "are the three words most talked of today. Many are going so far toward democracy that they have come to bolshevism." he sold. "The Senior Girls' Club of St. Andrew's provided the tempting refreshments, and the program included a "sing song," during which familiar hymns were sung with spirit.
