THRILLING STORY OF FRONTIER LIFE TOLD IN "WAGON TRACKS"

PRINCE RECEIVES DEGREE FROM QUEEN CITY UNIVERSITY

H. R. H. Is Made a Doctor of Literature and Laws.

TORONTO, Aug. 26.—According to arrangement this was to be a comparatively quiet day in the schedule of the official visit of Edward Prince of Wales, to the queen city of Toronto, but the festivities crowded into it have been many and varied.

Opening the day's work with the inspection of the military hospitals in this city with their whole battalions of patients, many maimed and bed-ridden from their fight for the empire in the great war, the prince showed the thoughtful sympathetic side of his nature. The smiling on to the visiting of the civil hospitals he was motored to the five-million-dollar general hospital, where he was particularly interested in the two-pound items of humanity in the incubator ward.

An item not on the program, but thoroughly enjoyed by the royal visitor and the juveniles visited, was the trip through Toronto's nationally famous hospital for sick children, founded and developed through the untiring efforts of the late John Ross Robertson, prominent newspaper proprietor. The princely heart went out in sympathy for the suffering children, and the princely hand went into his pocket for the price of toys for them.

After luncheon the progress of the prince was turned towards scholarship, and he was initiated into the ranks of the doctors of literature and laws, at Queen's University. Before the dons of higher education, as he has in the presence of all other classes of citizens, his royal highness acquitted himself admirably. His reply to the address was delivered with modest and clean manner a credit it was a credit to the royal speaker even in that hall devoted to eloquence and oratory.

From convocation hall the prince turned toward Government House for rather lighter duties. The garden party was on, and although the air was cold and the clouds threatening, it was a brilliant social affair.

After dinner his royal highness attended another social function, a dinner at the Royal Canadian Yacht Club, under the auspices of Brigadier-General John Gurn and the officers of the "Royal" Association of Toronto, including a membership of many thousands, will be inspected.

Tomorrow night his royal highness will leave for Ottawa.

LONDON MAN IN THE TOILS AT MONTREAL

Had Ingenious "Skin-Game," But Detectives Broke It Up.

HEARING IS ADJOURNED
Accused May Have To Face Additional Charge of Theft.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

MONTREAL, Aug. 26.—An ingenious "skin game" by which would-be motorists and conductors were fleeced \$3 per head as a "union fee" was revealed by Detective Howard, who gave information to police headquarters which led to the arrest last night of James A. Johnson of London, Ont., charged with obtaining money by false pretences and with acting as an employment agency at 227 Union avenue without license.

A few days ago Johnson opened an office at 227 Union avenue and advertised in the newspapers that he was an agent of the Toronto Street Railway Company and would hire carmen. Men who answered the advertisement were immediately hired without any questions or experience, and the carmen told they must pay \$3 entrance fee into "Motormen's and Conductors' Union."

Noticing the advertisement, Detective Howard at once sent a man hand over \$3 to the "agent" and receive in return a receipt for initiation into the fake union. Howard returned Inspector Cowan of the proceeding, and the latter detailed Detectives Beaton and Belanger to investigate Johnson's arrest followed, and when taken to headquarters the prisoner admitted his guilt by offering to make restitution to his clients.

Johnson was arraigned before Judge Martin this morning, charged with obtaining money by false pretences, and was remanded for equitable tomorrow. He will also have to appear in the recorder's court charged with acting as an employment agent without license.

Several articles were missing from other rooms at 227 Union avenue other than the one occupied by Johnson, and these articles were found in the prisoner's pockets, so that he may have to face an additional theft charge.

ARMY AND NAVY VETS HAVE WAR TROPHIES FOR WESTERN FAIR

Committee Completes Arrangements To Exhibit Thousand Souvenirs.

Hundreds and hundreds of war trophies, comprising one of the most complete and interesting collections in the Dominion, will be exhibited at the Western Fair by the Army and Navy Veterans' Association of the city. A total number approaching the 2,000 mark has been obtained by the veterans' committee, and from that horde the best and most unique trophies have been selected. The success of the exhibition is assured, for the members of the selection committee are all veterans who have fought through years of the war, and who, as a result of that long, grueling period, are best able to choose which trophies contain the greatest interest.

Secretary P. McKellar of the Army and Navy Association has just returned from Toronto with the choicest collection of trophies he could obtain and the exhibit has been added to the hundreds of trophies returned from the city. So, when the Western Fair is opened, the trophy exhibition will consist of over 1,000 articles—everything from a German Iron Cross to captured machine guns.

At the weekly meeting of the association last evening 24 new members were initiated. A considerable amount of routine business was discussed and dealt with.

TWO MEN KILLED IN TRACTOR ACCIDENT NEAR BRANTFORD

Joshua Buck and Herbert Miller Victims at Beavers Corners.

BRANTFORD, Aug. 26.—Joshua Buck and Herbert Miller were killed on the farm of William C. Beavers, near Beavers Corners, on Monday afternoon in a tractor accident. A number of men were present at the annual threshing, and Miller, who ran the tractor, went underneath to discover some trouble. In some way the machine started, cutting his head and killing him instantly. Buck, who was on the side-board, was struck by a big lever, and died at home during the night. He leaves a widow and family. Miller was unmarried.

BOARD OF WORKS NOW FAVORS THE PURCHASE OF MOTOR TRACTOR

Machine Will Be Used To Aid in City Work—25 Teams—ters Back To Work.

The purchase of a caterpillar tractor to be used in the city's construction work will be recommended to the city council. The board of works last night, on the advice of City Engineer Brazier, decided to take this step. The tractor, for which the Ontario Garage and Motor Sales hold the local agency, will cost \$1,600, and City Engineer Brazier estimates that it will do the work of two teams. Its cost will be charged the asphalt paving plant.

Ald. C. G. Moorhead questioned the advisability of making the purchase, on the ground that it might displace teamsters now in the city's employ, as well as those on strike, who might later return to work. The city engineer met the objection by stating that, even were the city to purchase five or six tractors there would still be employment for every teamster in the city. Twenty-five of the 40 teamsters who struck are back at work.

Mr. Brazier reported that he had not completed his examination of the Rigout street bridge, but recommended that a sign be placed there, drawing attention to the fact that the speed limit for vehicles on a highway is five miles an hour. The committee decided to place similar signs on all the wooden bridges.

A deputization of Knollwood Park, the purchase of a building for a city system in that section of the city. Plans for this work have been completed and the committee was asked to call for tenders for the work, as the city engineer claims that it is impossible to undertake a complete reconstruction of the city's sewerage system under the day labor plan. He estimated that the cost would be \$88,757, of which \$78,532 would be assessed against the property benefited and the remainder to the general tax rate. Tenders will also be asked for sewers on Palmer and Spartan avenues.

The building of sidewalks on 15th street from Adelaide to William street and on St. Julian street from Adelaide street to the Hamilton road will be recommended to the council.

The proposed by-law prohibiting vehicles to the limit of the city on the main intersection of the city was referred to the city solicitor to insure its legality. It will be presented at the next council meeting.

Ald. Moorhead and Wilson with Engineer Brazier were appointed a committee to investigate the condition of the storm sewer on Carlton avenue. The purchase of property from W. V. E. Baker for \$50 to eliminate a sharp turn in Rigout street near the east end of Blackfriars bridge was recommended.

The committee accepted an offer of \$88,000 from the Barber Asphalt Company in lieu of the company repaving pavements on Adelaide, Rectory and Rigout streets.

Tenders for 151 tons of coal for municipal buildings will be called for by the city engineer. The city will also investigate the possibility of draining the ponds.

No action was taken on a request to have work done on Adelaide street, north of the intersection of the city, to be sprayed with oil to prevent mosquitoes breeding, as the ponds are on private property. The city will investigate the possibility of draining the ponds.

A decision to pave a small section of Dundas street between the Dundas street bridge and the end of the present pavement was made on the motion of Ald. E. R. Seabrook. The ownership of the street is claimed by Whit Lamberton, but Ald. Seabrook maintains that the city has the right to pave it, as it has been used as a thoroughfare for many years. The recommendation must receive the approval of two-thirds of the council.
